LOOKING BACK & LOOKING FORWARD

Long before Christianity reached Italy with the arrival of St. Peter in Rome, the ancient Italians worshipped a multitude of gods. These were related to everyday life such as the god of the harvest, the vintage, the sea and the earth. Even ordinary domestic things such as the hearth and the door had their own gods. The god Janus was the guardian of the door and the gates and was represented with faces on the front and back of his head. January, the first month of the year was named after Janus because at this time of the year we tend to look back and forward: back on the year that's gone; forward to the year to come. Indeed, at New Year we tend to look back on all of our lives and look forward with, perhaps, some trepidation on what remains to us of life.

From childhood we grow in knowledge as we learn worldly wisdom at school and in the university of life. Frequently, alas, we lose our innocence during our formative years. Last Sunday we read in the Gospel that the boy Jesus advanced in wisdom, in age and in grace. He did so without loss of innocence. For the rest of us how easy it is to mistake folly for true wisdom, to take for granted the world's promise that owning things and doing things will bring us happiness, to silence a muttering conscience when we bend the rules of morality just a little to grasp what the world offers. "Sure I'm doing no harm to anybody; no one will ever find out; everyone else is doing it anyway...." And so the self delusion goes on until one day we realise that the only true happiness will come with the grace of a clear conscience.

St. Augustine regretted the years he had wasted in searching for human wisdom when he wrote in his "Confessions": "Late have I loved you, o Beauty so ancient and so new; late have I loved you! For behold you were within me,

and I outside; and I sought you outside and in my ugliness fell upon those lovely things that you have made... I was kept from you by those things... You chased away my blindness. I tasted you, and now hunger and thirst for you; you touched me and I have burned for your peace."

The new year while offering us the promise of a new future can also call us back to the love we had for Jesus in more innocent days just as old friendships call to us from the past. Mary Coleridge puts that thought nicely in one of her poems:

> Time brought me many another friend That loved me longer. New love was kind, but in the end Old love was stronger.

Years come and go. No New Year yet Hath slain December. And all that should have cried - "Forget!" Cries but - "Remember!"

Saturday 13. St Hilary, c315-c.367, was elected (c.353) bishop of Poitiers and distinguished himself by his stand against Arianism. Exiled (356-59) by Emperor Constantius because of his anti-arian efforts, he used the time to write. His major works include *De Trinitate*, a study of the trinity, and *De synodis*, a valuable historical record of the time; he also composed hymns.

Dr. Catherine Murphy, Specialist in Public Health Medicine said: "The SHB is concerned at the poor uptake of the vaccine amongst teenagers. Adolescents aged between 15-18 years, because of their vulnerability to the disease, are one of the primary target groups to receive the vaccine. We would urge these young people to take up the offer of the free vaccine. Many students will be returning home for Christmas and we would ask that they make an appointment and go along to see their Student Health Officer before term ends or to see their GP during the holidays. Meningitis is a serious and sometimes fatal condition and thankfully there is now a vaccine to protect against the devastating consequences of the disease".

Meningococcal infection is the most common infectious cause of death in children and young people up to the age of 20 years. Ireland has one of the highest rates of Meningococcal Group C infection in the developed world and the infection claimed 11 lives out of 165 confirmed cases reported in Ireland between July 1999 and June 2000.

More than 205,000 people in the SHB region will receive the Meningitis C vaccine on a phased basis (figures based on the 1996 census for 0-23rd birthday).

The incidence of this disease is of great concern to public health professionals. There was a 43% increase in Meningococcal C cases between July 1999 and June 2000 compared to the same time period the previous year. Reports from the UK have confirmed a 75% decrease in the number of cases of Meningococcal C infection since the introduction of a similar immunisation programme.

Dr. Murphy goes on to say: "The immunisation programme is particularly relevant for the people of Cork and Kerry as these areas have, in recent years, experienced higher than the national average incidences of Meningococcal disease. In particular in recent months the group C strain of the disease, which normally accounts for about one third of all reported cases, has been far more prominent in Cork and Kerry than the Group B strain. the Meningococcal C conjugate vaccine protects specifically against the group C strain of the disease, which is common in Ireland. Therefore, it is still vitally important to have a high a wareness of the symptoms of the disease".

The first phase of the immunisation programme has been given with parental consent to children aged 0-4 years inclusive by their GP/family doctor and also, by health board vaccination teams, to young people in school from Junior Certificate to Leaving Certificate as well as to 3rd level institutions first year students. Young people aged 15-18 years who are not in full-time education are encouraged to contact their health board regarding arrangements for immunisation.

The Meningococcal C conjugate vaccine, while new to Ireland, has been distributed widely in the UK; more than 15 million doses have been administered up to August 2000. A rate of less than 1 report of a specific reaction for every 10,000 doses distributed has been reported, with the majority of these reactions being non-serious.

NIGHT PRAYER

Now I am going to sleep and if this sleep be for me the sleep of death then may your own mighty hand lead me from the light of this world into the great light of eternity.

Our night prayers are our final conversation of the day with God, and this lovely old prayer from the Scottish Gaelic is a wonderful example of the spirit that should permeate our night prayer. This little prayer touches on so much of Christian faith and hope. It is a solemn but confident handing over of ourselves to God's loving care; it is a calm acknowledgement that we are pilgrims on this earth and that day by day, night by night, our heavenly Father is leading us to himself and to our heavenly home. Such an approach can help make our night prayer a richer experience. Many of us may have been encouraged or even dragooned, in our earliest years - 'Say your night prayers' before going to bed. What did that mean for us? Perhaps it was a quick act of contrition for anything we had done wrong in the day. Now, an examination of conscience and an act of contrition at the end of the day are excellent practices, and I hope we are doing this and leading our children to do likewise. However, our night prayer is not to consist of these acts only - it is, like all our prayers, to be centred on God and his grace. It reaches out to God in gratitude, contrition, trust, hope and petition. We need not focus straight away on our failures, rather try and see how God was with us during the day, what God was doing with us and for us, and how we responded. then we can thank God for his grace at work in us and ask pardon for our failures. Finally, we can ask God for the blessings of his protection and a good night's rest no small matter in our stressful world.

A suggested structure for night prayers:
(1) If possible find a quiet place. Let your mind and heart grow still. Put yourself in God's presence.
(2) Think about the day that is ending. How was God with me today, how did God help me? Or did I feel abandoned by God? How did God speak to me or challenge me through events? How did I respond?
(3) Give thanks to God for his grace at work in us. Ask pardon for sins and failures.
(4) Entrust yourself and all those you love to God's protection and ask for yourself and for the the

protection and ask for yourself and for the the blessings of a peaceful night and restoring sleep. (5) Finish with a prayer to Mary, our heavenly Mother:
