

READINGS FOR THE WEEK Second Week in Ordinary Time

21 Sunday Neh. 8:2-6. 8-10. Ps. 18. 1 Cor. 12:12-30. Lk. 1:1-4:4:14-21. Lect 1:841 The teaching of the Church on the Liturgy of the Word is expressed in these texts. Jesus states that the prophecy of Isaiah is fulfilled in himself: so the Scripture word is actualized for us each time it is proclaimed in church. Christ is really present in his Word. That Word challenges us to a renewal of life, as the people rediscovered their identity when Ezra read the law to them. Those who serve as ministers of the Word will find the joy of the Lord to be their strength.

22 Monday Heb. 9:15. 24-28. Ps. 97. Mk. 3:22-30 Lect II:27

We now live in the new covenant times when Jesus has conquered sin. But we await the final consummation when he returns in glory to claim us for himself.

23 Tuesday Heb. 10:1-10. Ps. 39. Mk. 3:31-35. Lect II:29

In the story of God's relationship with his people there is an often repeated warning about sacrifices which are purely external. In Christ we have the supreme expression of conformity to God's will in a sacrificial life.

24 Wednesday Heb. 10:11-18. Ps. 109. Mk. 4:1-20. Lect II:31

The parable of sowing and harvest tells us that God's glorious kingdom is still to come. God's kingdom will surely come despite the various difficulties experienced by those who work for it. We are to prepare by an upright life.

25 Thursday Acts. 22:3-16. or Acts 9:1-22. Ps. 116. Mk. 16:15-18. Lect II:928
St. Paul preached the power of God at work in the lives of each one of us. His own conversion shows that power in his life. Out of a persecutor God made a preacher and teacher of the peoples. Paul never ceased to express thanks and wonder for this grace. But he still prayed for perseverence.

27 Saturday Heb. 11:1-2. 8-19. Ps. Lk. 1:69-75. Mk. 4:35-41. Lect II:37 It was for faith that our ancestors were commended and that faith is praised in Abraham. Jesus expects faith in his disciples.

SAINTS THIS WEEK

Monday 22nd - St. Vincent, died 304, deacon of the church of Saragossa, Spain. Martyred in Valencia after prolonged torture

Wednesday 24th - St. Francis de Sales, 1567-1622, bishop of Geneva, founder of the Visitation Sisters. He worked with gentleness and love to rebuild the Catholic faith after the Reformation. Patron saint of writers, editors and journalists.

Friday 26th - Sts. Timothy and Titus, were close to St. Paul as followers and later in their work with him. Tradition makes Timothy the first bishop of Ephesus. And from Paul's advice to him to take some wine for his stomach's sake, he has been invoked as a patron in cases of stomach complaint.

Saturday 27th - St. Angela Merici, 1474-1540, founder of the Ursulines, devoted herself to Christian education based on love, kindness with firmness, and concern for the individual.




