EASTER SUNDAY

Today we face the greatest mystery of our faith, the mystery of how God works among us, bringing new life where before was only death. With a sense of wonder and with joy, we come today to thank God for the risen life of Jesus.

RESURRECTION

St. Paul had no doubts about the vital importance of the resurrection of Christ. "If Christ had not been raised then our preaching is useless and your believing it is

In proof of the reality of the Resurrection Catholic writers have put forward several arguments. Their main points are, firstly, Christ himself said that he would rise from the dead. "Destroy this temple and in three days I will raise it up". "The Son of Man will be in the heart of the earth for three days and three nights". "Tell the vision to

no man, till the Son of Man be risen from the dead". Secondly, Christ really died and was buried. All the Gospels say that Christ died on the Cross. The soldiers made sure he was dead by thrusting a lance into his side. Thirdly, the grave was found empty on the morning of the third day. He appeared to Mary Magdalen and other women. He appeared to the Apostles and spoke and ate

with them. He was seen by more than five hundred people at once.

These positive arguments are reinforced by the very weakness of the theories of unbelievers. One of the earliest explanations of the Resurrection was that the Apostles were deceivers. The guards at the sepulchre said that while they slept, the disciples came and removed the body. But, if the soldiers were asleep how could they know who stole the body? Besides, the disciples stood to gain nothing by such a deception. In the event they lost everything, including their lives, by preaching the Resurrection.

A favourite modern explanation of the miracle is to say that the Apostles were deceived. The argument suggests that the Apostles were in a state of nervous excitement after the crucifixion: their passionate longing for Christ bodied forth the vision of a risen Saviour. That an individual might suffer from such an hallucination is possible; that all the Apostles and hundreds of disciples should suffer from it over a long period is hardly likely. Besides, there was no passionate longing for the Resurrection. The followers of Christ were not expecting it. The women brought spices to embalm the body. Magdalen's first thought at the empty tomb was that someone had stolen the body. The Apostles did not believe the women's report of seeing Jesus. Thomas laid down conditions on which he would believe Others promoted the Trance idea: that Jesus never really died, that he fell into a trance or fainted on the cross, recovered consciousness in the tomb, pushed aside the stone and rejoined his companions pretending that he had triumphed over death. Suppose for a moment it were true, could one so severely wounded have moved aside the great stone? Besides, could one who had led such a blameless life turn out to be a deceiver?

These points show that it is not unreasonable to believe in the Resurrection. In the end, however, what matters is the gift of Faith which comes to us with sanctifying grace. We live by Faith when the great truths which God has revealed to us are so frequently present in prayer that they influence our life and action.

READINGS FOR THE WEEK

Acts. 10:34, 37-43. Ps. 117. Col. 3:1-4 or 1 Cor. 5:6-9. 15 Sunday Jn. 20:1-9. Lect I: 417

The Gospel from the Easter Vigil Lk. 24:1-12 may be used at the Day Mass "Christ is risen, alleluia!" This is the ancient Christian greeting on this day of great joy and happiness for all. "Easter is not simply one feast among others, but the 'Feast of feasts'. The mystery of the Resurrection, in which Christ crushed death, permeates with its powerful energy our old time, until all is subjected to him."

Evening Mass: Gospel: Lk. 24:13-35 may be used. They recognised him of the breaking of bread. Lect I:428.

16 Monday Acts. 2:14, 22-32. Ps. 15. Mt. 28:8-15. Lect I:423 The women clasp the feet of the real body of the risen Lord who is thus identified with the earthly Jesus. But they are not to cling on in signs of love. His appearances are for the purpose of sending them on mission, to tell others.

17 Tuesday Acts. 2:36-41. Ps. 32. Jn. 20:11-18. Lect I:425 Mary Magdalen is told that the old relationship is now changed, she is not to cling on, for Jesus has to return to the Father, to fulfil what he had been sent to do.

18 Wednesday Acts. 3:1-10. Ps. 104. Lk. 24:13-35. Lect I:427 Two disillusioned followers who cannot understand are met by someone who opens their minds and hearts by showing how God's word can give meaning to their lives. Invited to share their table, he takes bread, blesses it, breaks it and gives it to them, and they know the Lord Jesus in that fourfold action. With joy they go back to tell the good news.

19 Thursday Acts. 3:11-26. Ps. 8. Lk. 24:35-48. Lect I:430 "Immediately they touched him, and through this contact with his flesh and spirit, they believed" (Ignatius of Antioch). And Jesus, though in his risen body he did not need food, shows them the courtesy of sharing their food.

20 Friday Acts. 4:1-12. Ps. 117. Jn. 21:1-14. Lect I:432

The appearance at the lakeside - perhaps on a Sunday morning after a Sabbath rest from work - has echoes of the meals that Jesus shared during his earthly life. It recalls the sign of the Eucharist in the multiplication of the loaves and fishes.

21 Saturday Acts. 4:13-21. Ps. 117. Mk. 16:9-15. Lect I:435 The news of the resurrection brings belief or incredulity. Jesus has to reproach his disciples for being so slow to believe. They are to go out with the Good News, and the response to their preaching will be again belief or unbelief. Only those who believe will be

Next Sunday's Readings: Acts. 5:12-16. Ps. 117. Apoc. 1:9-13, 17-19. Jn. 20:19-31.

Eight days later, Jesus came in.

Little Things

There are times when we all may feel that life owes us something, that we are good citizens who have never hurt our neighbours and never broken the laws of our society. Perhaps some of us even think that we have never done anything wrong within our community. Whilst probably not absolutely perfect, we have never deliberately gone out of our way to offend or disobey the accepted codes and laws. But.....if we think for a moment and honestly examine our conscience, have we not erred in committing minor offences or turning a blind eye to injustices? How many would consider it wrong to park illegally, to drive to fast, or to discard a small piece of litter? Or, it may be a little thing, but how many customers would return to a shop if they received too much change? Some of us may exclaim: But I've never done any of these! What about church collection? Do we honestly contribute what we can reasonably afford? Do we notice the beggar at the church-gates? How many of us walk blindly past, filled with the Body of Christ, ignoring the outstretched hand? If we are to be ruthlessly truthful with ourselves, we must reluctantly admit that few of us are 'without sin' and can be trusted not only to be scrupulously honest with our fellow man, but with God who created us and knows all our faults and failures. It is not only the 'big' crimes or sins that may cause us to fall by the wayside but the simple minor offences that we enact every day and consider unimportant. Perhaps we ought to remember the Gospel of Luke, which reminds us that 'The man who can be trusted in little things can be trusted in great....' (Luke. 16:1-13)


CIRCLES OF LIVING ROSARY "PRAYER GROUP"
