READINGS FOR THE WEEK

13 Sunday Acts. 14:21-27. Ps. 144. Apoc. 21:1-5. Jn. 13:31-33. 34-35. Lect 1:517

Love shown in the members of the Church enables the community to be seen as disciples of Christ. Mutual love within the community overflows to the whole world. Christian charity helps to ease the burden of suffering and eliminate many of its causes.

14 Monday Acts. 1:15-17. Ps. 112. Jn. 15:9-17. Lect I:1023

15 Tuesday Acts. 14:19-28. Ps. 144. Jn. 14:27-31. *Lect I:522* "As witnesses of the Risen One, the apostles - and Peter in particular - remain the foundation stones of his Church. *CCC 642*

16 Wednesday Acts. 15:1-6. Ps. 121. Jn. 15:1-8. *Lect 1:524* The apostles and teachers come together in search of unity of faith. The branches must remain part of the vine so that life will flow to them and they will bear fruit.

17 Thursday Acts. 15:7-21. Ps. 95. Jn. 15:9-11. *Lect I:526* Jesus loves his disciples with that same gift of love with which the Father loves him. Genuine love means attending to the needs and weaknesses of others.

18 Friday Acts. 15:22-31. Ps. 56. Jn. 15:12-17. *Lect I:528* Jesus tells his disciples that the world will fail to understand them and so persecute them. The followers of Jesus will get the same treatment as he received. But they must have courage and go out with the Good News to others.

19 Saturday Acts. **16:1-10.** Ps. **99.** Jn. **15:18:21.** Lect *E531* The conflict between the believer and the world is part of the Christian's inheritance. The disciple can not expect other than what his Master also received. It is better to be persecuted for doing right than simply to conform to the ways of the world.

SAINTS THIS WEEK

Monday 14th - **St. Matthias,** like all apostles, was chosen to become "a witness with us of Christ's resurrection". The story of his election as one of the apostles is given in the first reading. He seems to have spent a great deal of time working in Judea; then he travelled east to Cappadocia (now Turkey), where it is said that he was the vital instrument in bringing many pagans to the faith. He is said to have been martyred at Colchis on the Black Sea and his relics brought to Rome by St. Helena.


Tuesday 15th - **St. Carthage**, (or Mochuta) hailed from a rich family in Kerry. As he loved the chanting of the Psalms, the local king arranged for him to become a priest. Having spent a year possibly at Bangor he founded his own monastery at Rohan in 595. It grew rapidly. But opposition made him move southwards around 637. He, with hundreds of monks and their patients for the leper colony, finally arrived at Lismore, where he made a foundation. He died in 638.

Wednesday 16th - **St. Brendan**, was a Kerryman who was born in 486. He studied at Clonard under Finnian. His name is connected with many places in Kerry, such as Ardfert and Mount Brandon. He visited Scotland and reached the Hebrides and possibly areas beyond. He founded a monastery in Clonfert in 568 and died there in 578.

Friday 18th - St. John I, died 526, was involved in Arian controversies and imprisoned at Ravenna, where he died.

St. Thérese of the Child Jesus remember thy promise

to do good upon earth. Shower down thy roses on those who invoke thee. Obtain for us from God the graces we hope for from his infinite goodness. Amen.



BALLINCOLLIG COMMUNITY GAMES

We have been very busy for the last couple of weeks with Ballincollig kids taking part in a number of competitions.

On Saturday 22nd April our girls U-13 Indoor Soccer Team headed for the Neptune Stadium for the CMP Dairies sponsored County Finals. In the Semi-Final against Mitchelstown an early goal from Niamh McKenzie settled the nerves and Ballincollig remained well on top for the remainder of the game with Susan Kelly adding a second goal, enabling Ballincollig to run out comfortable 2-0 winners. In the final Ballincollig faced Glounthaune/Little Island and got off to a great start when Ciara McSwiney scored in the first minute. The Ballincollig team now go forward to represent Cork in the Munster Finals on July 14th. The Ballincollig Team was Susan Kelly (Capt), Ciara McSwiney, Niamh McKenzie, Ellen Jackson, Vicky MacCullagh, Zoe Murphy and Lisa Hurley. A special word of thanks and praise to managers Mary and Michael Collins who are putting great effort into the promotion of girls soccer in Ballincollig. On Saturday 29th April a number of children from Ballincollig took part in the Swimming Finals at Leisureworld, Bishopstown. In the Boys U-10 Gavin Hennigan, Sean Kiely, Stephen Murphy and Conor Wall competed with Sean being particularly unlucky not to qualify for the final of the U-10 Freestyle. In the Girls U-10 Backstroke Saffron Crowley O'Sullivan put up a great display. Alison Cooper qualified for the final of the Girls U-14 Breaststroke while Jane Lucey and Fiona Hedderman both qualified for the Final of the Girls U-14 Backstroke. Words and Wounds

Did you hear about what's-his-name? or 'Wait till I tell you...' is usually the preamble one uses when they are going to talk about a colleague or neighbour. It is usually the beginning of a scandalous account concerning someone else's misfortunes or mishaps and like most people, our eyes widen perceptibly as we wait eagerly to hear the latest gossip. Of course, we do not encourage scandal but we cannot stop other people talking, can we? And, we rationalise, it is probably the truth anyway, and what harm is it in listening? We may wish that they would finish but we do not really try to interrupt them, nodding our heads in absent-minded agreement. Being good Christians, we do not actively encourage them and may offer feeble excuses that we have to go. We try to intrude by making half-hearted suggestions that perhaps one ought to sympathise with those less fortunate than ourselves, but our weak attempts are blithely ignored as the litany of public reproach continues unabatedly. The speaker knows that you are a receptive audience, a person who is not strong enough to defend someone else's character...that you will listen meekly ... and will continue to do so until they decide that they are finished. It is only when you walk away that you tell yourself: I should have said this or that.....but I did not...... Indeed, you did not seriously try to dissuade the other person from hurting someone else with words, words that not only wounded the unfortunate person who was spoken about, but which also impaired your own integrity. You might call to mind that not only evil actions cause pain, that 'Sharp words can wound as deeply as any sword, but wisely chosen words can heal' PROVERBS 12:8
