Through the scriptures God has given us the hope of justice for the poor and a longing for peace and harmony among people. Christ came to fulfil that promise, but to receive it we must turn our lives away from everything that is sinful.

THE NEW CURRENCY

Over the past months shoppers have been warned against price rises in January under cover of the introduction of the euro. There is no need to warn contributors to charitable organisations as they receive only voluntary contributions. When you come to Mass nobody specifies the contribution you should make. It is entirely up to yourself. If worshippers give the same figure in euro as they did in old money the results will be serious. If the person who always contributed £1 now gives one euro the consequences will be dire for parish services.

The parish provides a range of services to the public - accommodation in a comfortable building for Sunday Masses, week-day Masses and other church services, school subsidy, cemetery maintenance, etc. For these services no charges are specified or demanded. They depend on the voluntary contributions of those who attend Sunday Mass.

If the Mass goer who give £1 at Mass gives instead 1 euro in the New Year it will mean a drop in church income of 20%. If the person who gives 50 pence gives 50 cents instead; if the person who gives 20p gives instead 20 cent; the consequence loss will amount to one fifth of income. If, for instance, your family income were to drop suddenly by 20% the cut-backs in your housekeeping budget would be ruinous. In business, a 20% drop in sales would indicate imminent bankruptcy.

The Parish Council has set up a committee to study the effect the introduction of the new currency might have on parish income. The members feel that this page of the Parishioner should be devoted to this topic for the next few weeks so that the parishioners who have so generously supported their parish over all the recent years of massive development will not let it down now through thoughtlessness. Even though we rarely dwell on money matters in this parish we feel it would be negligent not to highlight the dangers to our debt repayment and on-going running costs posed by the currency confusion of the coming month. So, rather apologetically, we will analyse the whole matter of parish funding in the coming weeks.

SECOND WEEK IN ADVENT

9 Sunday Is. 11:1-10. Ps. 71. Rom. 15:4-9. Mt. 3:1-12. *Lect I:24* John the Baptist is a prophetic voice for all ages: his messages speaks to us today, for conversion is always part of the Christian way of living. Conversion to each other is called for by St. Paul, so that we can be tolerant of each other, united in mind and heart.

10 Monday Is. 35:1-10. Ps. 84. Lk. 5:17-26. *Lect I:33* The marvellous vision of God's saving love is expressed in some of the most poetic language of the prophet. This vision is realised in the life and works of Jesus Christ.

11 Tuesday Is. 40:1-11. Ps. 95. Mt. 18:12-14. Lect I:35 Isaiah's words of comfort breathe the very spirit of Advent. The nation's slavery is ended and God will lead his people in a new Exodus. The road must be prepared for God to travel on.

12 Wednesday Is. 40:25-31. Ps. 102. Mt. 11:28-30. *Lect I:38* "The people are not to grow weary and tired, thinking that the Lord has deserted them. Those who hope in him will renew their strength, they will sprout wings like eagles." Jesus promises rest to the weary and overburdened.

13 Thursday Is. 41:13-20. Ps. 144. Mt. 11:11-15. Lect I:40 From today the Gospel passage are about St. John Baptist and the first readings either continue the Isaiah readings or are chosen in relation to the Gospel.

"St. John the Baptist is the Lord's immediate precursor or forerunner, sent to prepare his way. 'Prophet of the Most High'". John surpasses all the prophets, of whom he is the last.

13 Friday Is. 48:17-19. Ps. 1. Mt. 11:16-19. *Lect I:42* The people of Jesus' own time have acted in a self-willed way, never consistent nor satisfied and have refused the offer of salvation. Neither the ascetical John, nor Jesus, with his free and easy way at table with sinners, can bring them to faith.

14 Saturday Sir. 48:1-4, 9-11. Ps. 79. Mt. 17:10-13. Lect I:44 Going before Jesus in the spirit and power of Elijah, John bears witness to Christ in his preaching, by his Baptism of conversion, and through his martyrdom.

SAINTS THIS WEEK

11 Tuesday - St. Damasus I, died 11 December 384, was pope from 366 to 384. He insisted on the apostolic foundations of the Roman See and was active in suppressing Arianism and other heresies. He commissioned St. Jerome to prepare the Vulgate version of the Bible.

12 Wednesday - St. Finnian, studied in Idrone (Co. Carlow) and later in Wales and on his return to Ireland he settled in Clonard, Co. Meath, around 520, where he established a famous school. His pupils, among who were Canice, Colum Cille, and Brendan, were the initators of the great monastic expansion in Ireland. He died in 549 and is remembered as the tutor of the saints of Ireland.

St. Jane Frances de Chantal, 1572-1641, was left a widow with six children at the age of 29. With the support and direction of St. Francis de Sales, she had founded more than eighty convents of Visitation nuns by the time of her death.

13 Thursday - St. Lucy, died 304 in Sicily, is invoked for eye trouble. She suffered much for her desire to remain consecrated to Christ alone. She was martyred by a sword thrust through her throat.

14 Friday - St. John of the Cross, 1542-91, a Carmelite who suffered much in his work of spreading the reform of the Carmelites. He was a man of prayer, an outstanding poet and spiritual writer. Declared Doctor of the Church in 1926.

AN ADVENT STORY

Advent always seems to me a very peaceful, full-of-promise time. As a child it was the happy whisperings. Soon it would be the birthday of baby Jesus. Everyone would be kind to each other. These kindnesses would be our gifts to the Babe. We'd get presents too. Each parent took us out to buy presents for the other parent. We learned to make happy secrets and to give.

Later it was time when our much wanted first born child was born. She, going home from the hospital late on Christmas Eve, was the gift of love, joy and promise our live was bringing to the world.

She, like thousands of other youngsters, died when she was barely a woman. Her death came on a sun-filled day just one Spring after her brother had died on

another Spring day full of promise of joy and life. She was 18. He was 11. Their love is a legacy very like the Advent feeling. It that led to a charity named after them, the Nigel Clare Network Trust (NCNT) Clare will always be 18. Nigel will stay 11 forever. It will always be a joy to give to them.

NCNT works with families where a children's lives are limited by length, quality or both. Few people can imagine anything worse than the death of a child. But is a fact of life for thousands of families where a child is born with, or develops a condition which limits young lives. For some time the organisation has worked in the UK to help these families in a very practical way. Now it is setting up in Ireland. The number of affected children in the Republic is not yet known. NCNT Ireland is hoping to raise the funds to find out and to set up services relevant to Irish families.

It is a little known fact that the extra time and money costs of caring for a life-limited child can bring real hardship. Most families try to go on making a living while meeting all the extra demands. Healthy brothers and sisters suffer, parents are faced with mounting costs and less time to make the needed money. At this time of the year there are may families fearing for the security of a young life. There are many remembering past advents and times filled with secrets, promises and silent holy nights that once saw a wide-eyed special child through a nativity scene.

Each and every parent will understand the need to provide. Not so many will understand what it is like to be filled with the love and promise of Advent and to no longer have a child recipient for all the hope and promise. For many of the parents, I work with the need to make happy surprises for children at this time of the year is a yearning set deep in their spines. Yet because a child has died too many folks see no further than the loss. My advent prayer is that every bereaved parent everywhere will be welcomed for what they can bring to a child's life, not sympathised with for what they have lost. They need the gift of being allowed to give.
