SAINTS THIS WEEK

28th - St Thomas Aquinas was born in Italy in 1224. Thomas taught that Christian revelation and human knowledge are aspects of a single truth and cannot be in conflict with one another. Patron of schools, universities, students and booksellers.

30th - Saint Aidan of Maedoc (Mogue, was born around 550, probably in County Cavan. He was baptised Aed but affection for the child developed his name into Mo AedOc. His father gave him as a hostage to Ainmire, king of Ireland, who was so pleased with him that he gave him and the other hostages their freedom. Aidan studied under David in Wales and on his return he founded a monastery at Ferns. He became bishop there and was renowned for his generosity and kindness. He died in 626 and his Lives testify to his popularity both in Cavan and in Ferns.

31st - St John Bosco, 1815-1888, born in Piedmont, he founded the Salesians to educate boys for life. He also became involved in publishing catechetical material for youth. He is a patron saint of youth and of Catholic publishers.

1st February - St Brigid is invoked as patron of scholars, poets, blacksmiths, healers, cattle,dairyworkers, newborn babies and fugitives.


