THE DOOR TO HOPE

There are quite a few people today who are deeply dissatisfied with their own private lives. They have closed the door on life. God is kept outside. They have lost hope. Are you one of them?

In the confusion of the twenty years or so, people have drifted away from the practice of their religion. Now they find themselves in apparently hopeless situations, addicted to drink or drugs, or caught up in a way of life that they know is dishonest and unjust. But they see no way out. The gospels show Jesus going about doing good. Hope flowed from him, the sick were healed, the bereaved consoled and the poor comforted. Sinners had a special place in his heart. What a comfort this is to all of us in this time of Lent.

Do we realise that the same Jesus is knocking at the door of our lives. Do we ever stop to listen? How often do we turn a deaf ear when we hear his knock? We are now in the season of Lent, a time of great hope although we sometimes lose hope when we look around at our imperfect world. Let us pray in this lenten season that we will open the door to Jesus and to hope.

SECOND WEEK OF LENT

24 Sunday Gen. 12:1-4. Ps. 32. 2 Tim. 1:8-10. Mt. 17:1-9. Lect I: 223 Through his Cross, Christ entered into his glory. We are already at this point in Lent at the heart of the Paschal mystery. The catechumens, having been shown the struggle needed, are pointed towards their own exodus. The disciples on the mountaintop, seeing Jesus transfigured, are encouraged for the days when they meet the cross. We are all called to holiness. If we respond as did Abraham and Jesus, then we will come to a glorious transfiguration.

25 Monday Dan. 9:4-10. Ps. 78. Lk. 6:36-38. Lect I: 231

Daniel sees the goodness and generous love of God and contrasts the wickedness and betrayal of the people. He recognises the community aspect of that sin that has brought punishment on all the people high and low. And only God can heal them for to him alone mercy and pardon belong.

26 Tuesday Is. 1:10,16-20. Ps. 49. Mt. 23:1-12. *Lect I*: 232 Isaiah doesn't call for repentance for sin and rebellion; he calls for a complete turnabout. Christian example must eschew pride and arrogance.

27 Wednesday Jer. 18:18-20. Ps. 30. Mt. 20:17-28. *Lect I:* 234 "Save me in your love, 0 Lord." This prayer to be saved reminds us that salvation comes from God alone.

28 Thursday Jer. 17:5-10. Ps. 1. Lk. 16:19-31. Lect I: 236
The Gospel story of the poor man Lazarus is about the choice that each one has to make of life or death. It is a responsible choice because we have Moses and the prophets, and Jesus himself, to show us the alternatives.

MARCH 2002

1 Friday Gen. 37:3-4,12-13, 17-28. Ps. 104. Mt. 21:33-43, 45-46. *Lect I:* 239 The Bible could be described as a book of memories of God's wonderful works in the history of the chosen people. To remember is in some way to make present, to involve the hearer in the action. So Jesus' listeners "realised that he was speaking about them".

2 Saturday Micah 7:14-15.18-20, Ps. 102. Lk 15:1-3.11_32 *Lect I:241*. The Lord who throws down our faults to the bottom of the sea is seen in the parable of the Prodigal Son.

BALLINCOLLIG BYPASS PROJECT

Construction work has now begun on the Ballincollig Bypass Project.

The route will extend from Bandon Road roundabout at the eastern end to Ovens Bridge on the existing N22 Cork/Killarney Road at the western end.

The scheme will involve the construction of more than 11 km of dual carriageway, some 10 km of single carriageway, 4 interchanges, 9 overbridges and a number of large culverts and farm underpasses. Site clearance works are now underway adjoining the Killumney Road at Greenfield and fencing works are on-going over the entire site. The Bypass is due to open to traffic in December 2004.

Preliminary design for the Bypass was carried out in the National Roads Regional Design Office in Richmond, Glanmire. Statutory procedures required to bring the scheme to land acquisition stage were also carried out in the Regional Design Office.

Detailed design was completed by MCO'Sullivan and Co. Ltd., Consulting Engineers who will also oversee the construction phase to completion. MCO'Sullivans are one of Irelands leading road design / project management consultants employing in excess of 300 people in offices located in Cork, Dublin and Galway.

Construction of the Bypass will be carried out by GAMA-Tubin construction Ltd. The joint venture company is a subsidiary of two major construction companies, GAMA and Tubin.

GAMA is a Turkish based multi-national company with nearly 10,000 employees worldwide specialising in power plants, refineries, petrochemical projects, industrial and civil structures etc. Tubin is also a well established construction company specialising in highway construction. They have recently completed three major projects totalling over 200km of motorway.

GAMA Construction has had a base in Ireland since 1998. They are currently undertaking four different contracts in the Dublin area and employ over 300 people two thirds of whom are Irish nationals.

The estimated cost of the Bypass Project is € 135 million and the Project is funded under the National Development Plan (2000-2006) and is co-financed by the European Regional Development Fund.

STATEMENT OF THE IRISH EPISCOPAL CONFERENCE ON THE PROPOSED ABORTION REFERENDUM - Part 2 -

- 10. The issues raised and addressed by the proposed referendum are crucial and merit the serious attention of all voters. In recognising the proposed legislation as a significant anti-abortion measure rather than a comprehensive pro-life amendment, we see the proposed referendum as an opportunity to ensure that more secure protection is offered to the unborn. We believe that this is an opportunity that should not be lost, as a rejection of this measure would effectively leave the X-Case judgement as the authoritative legal interpretation of Article 40.3.3.
- 11. We share the concern of many groups and individuals that the new proposal strengthens legal protection for the unborn only after implantation in the womb. We understand the reluctance of many who are opposed to abortion to vote for a measure which does not seem to vindicate the right to life of the unborn from the moment of conception. However, it is our conviction that the new proposal represents a considerable improvement on the existing situation, and that it does not in itself deny or devalue the worth and dignity of the human embryo prior to implantation.
- 12. In dealing with what appears to be a limited or imperfect measure, we believe that, in the context of The Gospel of Life (#73), Catholic voters should feel free in conscience to support this measure, even if it is viewed as less than might have been desired.
- 13. We are of the view that a clear legal prohibition on procured abortion, as set out in this proposal, represents an important step towards ensuring adequate protection for the life of the unborn. However we are aware that legal measures alone will never suffice, and that ultimately we must always be guided by the moral law, which forbids deliberate abortion and demands that we do everything in our power to cherish and support life at every moment of its existence.
- 14. Abortion, in the moral sense, "is the deliberate and direct killing, by whatever means it is carried out, of a human being in the initial phase of his or her existence, extending from conception to birth" (The Gospel of Life #58). Any intentional destruction of human life once begun, whether by experimentation, so-called therapeutic cloning, chemical means, such as the morning-after pill, or by medical intervention is contrary to the moral law.
- 15. We wish to express our continuing commitment to supporting any woman faced with an unwanted pregnancy. In particular, we want to express our pastoral concern for those women who feel that abortion is the only option available to them. We warmly endorse the work of CURA which was set up to ensure that any woman unhappily pregnant has easy access to the help she needs.
- 16. At the same time we are reminded by Pope John Paul II that "often the woman is the victim of male selfishness, in the sense that the man, who has contributed to the conception of the new life, does not want to be burdened with it and leaves the responsibility to the woman" (Crossing the Threshold of Hope p.206).
- 17. In conclusion, we encourage all our people to vote in the forthcoming referendum, and we ask that these coming weeks be a time of special prayer for God's guidance.
