It takes at least two to make a friendship. God loves us, but there is no relationship between him and us unless we return his love. In this relationship there can be no pretence nor living on the past. Our response to God must continue every day to be real, just as his love for us is a daily reality.

IMPORTANT ANNIVERSARY

Forty years ago the Second Vatican Council opened in Rome on the 11th. of October, 1962. More than 2,500 bishops were present at the opening Mass - the greatest gathering at any Council in the history of the Church. After the Mass, Pope John XXIII addressed the Fathers of the Council, showing them the way in which the Council must move, and the spirit which must animate it. On that day a train of events was set in motion that changed our religious lives for ever.

Today, in a typical Irish parish evidence of the changes introduced by the Council is all about us. Mass is said in English. Lay people read the Lessons and assist in the distribution of Holy Communion. Parishioners are consulted on all matters within the framework of the Parish Council. Modern hymns are sung by the choir. Marriages between Catholics and Protestants are solemnised with all the ceremonies formerly reserved for all Catholic weddings. Sins are forgiven in ceremonies of reconciliation. Catholics attend Protestant church ceremonies and Catholics can marry Protestants in the Protestant church with the Protestant minister as principal celebrant. The list of changes could go on and on.

The Vatican Council also brought about immense changes beyond the limits of our local parish. The Council documents are especially noteworthy for their concern with the poor. They insist on the unity of the human family and therefore on the wrongness of discrimination on grounds of race, religion, educational background and poverty. They put repeated emphasis on the Christian's duty to help build a just and peaceful world, a duty that he must carry out in brotherly cooperation with men of good will regardless of their religious persuasion or nationality.

Thanks to the direction given us by the Vatican Council of forty years ago we, Catholics, feel at home in the modern world. Catholics, especially in the Third World, are in the forefront of the fight for justice. Issues of the day such as peace, justice, the right to life, race relations, etc. are constantly mentioned in the prayers of the faithful at Mass. Inspired by the leadership of a fearless Pope, we help by prayer and financial sacrifice to make the modern world a fitting home for all God's children.

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THE VOICE OF THE LEGION OF MARY

AFRICA

BURUNDI

Forty members died in a four-month period due to war and/or a malaria epidemic. Legion membership was, up to some years ago, confined to adults, but in more recent times young people have been joining in increasing numbers which in turn has had the effect of increased vocations to the priesthood. In an area where the legionaries had to walk six hours each way to attend a monthly meeting, a higher council has been established locally.

CENTRAL AFRICAN REPUBLIC

No diocese in this country has less than 1,000 members. In Bangui itself there are 17,000 members.

REPUBLIC OF CONGO

Due to the situation in this country, postal services are slow. A wide apostolate is undertaken through home and hospital visitation. Many marriages have been regularised, children are prepared for the sacraments, non-catholics were met and large numbers were encouraged to return of practice of their faith. Legion members continue to work under very difficult conditions. In another area, mention is made of contact with witch doctors, prostitutes, drug addicts and alcoholics - all were encouraged to leave their lifestyle and return to practice of the faith.

RWANDA

Works are done in prisons and orphanages and for street children, as well as in homes and hospitals.

The Legion must be, so to speak, obsessed by that final commandment. It must as a first principle, set out to establish a contact of some sort of every soul everywhere. If this be done - and it can be done - then the lord's command will be moving toward fulfilment.

THE SUNDAY READINGS

FIRST READING: Ezek. 18:25-28

The prophet combats the belief that children are punished for the sins of their parents. Each individual is responsible only for his own sins. Moreover if the just man sin or the sinner be converted neither the good deeds of the former nor the evil deeds of the latter will be remembered. This teaching on personal responsibility and divine mercy is as relevant to life today as it was thousands of years ago.

SECOND READING: Phil. 2:1-11

In making the case that we should all be humble Paul's language becomes poetic as he describes the humility of Jesus. Jesus was equal to God and lowered himself to the level of us humans. Even more he accepted death which is the end of all humans. Even the death he chose was to be one of the most painful and humiliating known to man. How then can we consider ourselves better than others?

GOSPEL: Matt.21: 28-32


The significant point about the parable is the contrast between a farmer's two sons: one, beginning with a flat refusal, ends with obedience; the other, in appearance at least obedient, is in effect non-cooperative. There can be no doubt which did the will of the father. Swiftly upon the inevitable answer comes the devastating application of the parable. The tax collector who had listened to John the Baptist and the woman of evil life who had listened to Jesus will go into the Kingdom even now. There is as yet no sign that the chief priests and the elders of the people are on their way.

SAINT OF THE WEEK 9 04 - OCTOBER - 02

ST. FRANCIS OF ASSISI

Son of a wealthy cloth merchant in the Italian city of Assisi, Francis as a young man led the pleasure seeking life typical of young men of his class. Like most of such youths he got involved in the inter city skirmishes between Assisi and Perugia where he was held captive for a year. A fever which he contracted as a prisoner turned his thoughts to eternity. A further bout of illness resulted in his conversion to the spiritual life. When his father discovered that Francis was selling the family goods to help the poor he had him confined to a room. Later his mother released him and he went to live as a hermit in a ruined church near the city renouncing all worldly possessions and helping to nurse some lepers. He dressed in the brown woolen tunic tied with a knotted rope, the dress then worn by the poorest Umbrian peasants while he preached to the same peasants penance, brotherly love and peace.

In his newly found poverty, Francis was soon joined by a rich magnate of the city and a Canon of the Cathedral. These new recruits went to the public square where they gave away all their belongings to the poor and went to live in huts at a spot called the Porziuncola where he had restored with his bare hands the ruined church of St. Mary of the Angels. More followers joined him and the Friars Minor were formed as a religious Order. The order was approved by the Pope and Francis was ordained a Deacon and spent the rest of his life preaching repentance in the streets, in public squares, from the walls of castles. So many wanted to join his movement that he devised the Third Order, a sort of middle state between the world and the cloister for those who could not leave their families to join the First Order, or Friars Minor.

Today this Third Order meets monthly in Ballincollig helping lay people to live in the spirit of the great St. Francis.

Questions

Q. What's this advertising campaign on Power to Change all about? Is this safe - or is it some dangerous sect in disguise?

A. This campaign is a missionary effort to bring the living reality of Jesus before people. It is a combined effort involving the various Christian families—a great advance on past prejudices. At the end of the Great Jubilee year AD 2000, Pope John Paul urged us to keep our eyes fixed on Jesus and to launch out into the deep, in the spirit of the first apostles. Power to Change is a campaign that deserves our full backing.

Q. A huge amount of money is being spent advertising this Power to Change campaign. Everybody in Ireland has already heard about Christianity so why not spend this money on something more practical?

A. Everybody in Ireland has heard about beer but they still advertise it. People might know about Jesus but how many actually knowJesus? How many really know Jesus in a one-to-one daily relationship? To hear people abuse his name, he hardly means much to them. In the Gospel Jesus healed people physically, morally and spiritually. He is with us today if we answer his call and take him seriously. He has the power to change your life for the better.
