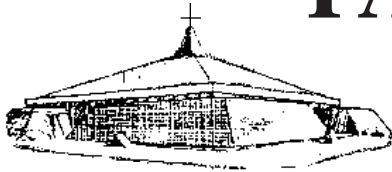

BLIND OBEDIENCE

I have always been interested in caves and in exploring cave systems. There are dangers involved since it is easy to lose one's way in the darkness of the caves. The air is clean and pure, devoid of all dust or pollen particles. The air temperature is constant all year round. The atmosphere is strangely silent apart from the gushing of underground streams.

Several years ago when I was living in Australia, I had several opportunities of pursuing this interest in the subterranean sphere. On one such occasion I was invited by Aussie friends to join them in exploring a cave system which had been discovered some years before then in a remote part of the New South Wales outback. Due to their recent discovery, the caves had not been mapped out, so we had to rely entirely on the expertise of a guide. His name was Meriwa. He was an elderly aborigine who had lived all his life in the area. He had an intimate knowledge of that cave system.

However, before we entered the caves, Meriwa insisted that we would obey him, that we would do exactly as he asked of us. We followed Meriwa in blind obedience for many hours through the dark caves until he led us back again to the now blinding, bright light of day. our obedience to Meriwa was not blind, but rather it was enlightened. we had faith in him and confidence in his ability to guide us to safety.

God too, asks us to obey him. Do we submit blindly to God? No, our response to God is illuminated by our faith and by our trust in him.

We obey god by keeping his rules and regulations. These we find in the Ten Commandments. In one of these commandments, God tells us that we must obey our Father & Mother. God is our Father and we are his children. Thus our response to God must be one of obedience.

As one of my friends & I were led through the darkness of the caves by Meriwa, so also God will lead us, his

READINGS FOR THE WEEK

13 Sunday Is. 25:6-10. Phil.4:12-14,19 20. Mt.22:1-14. Lect 1: 711

A special commitment is needed with regard to certain aspects of the Gospel's radical message that are often less well understood, even to the point of making the Church's presence unpopular, but which nevertheless must be a part of her mission of charity. I am speaking of the duty to be committed to respect for the life of every human being, from conception until natural death. For Christian witness to be effective, especially in these delicate and controversial areas, it is important that special efforts be made to explain properly the reasons for the Church's position; stressing that it is not a case of imposing on nonbelievers a vision based on faith, but of interpreting and defending the values rooted in the very nature of the human person.

St Teresa of Avila, 1515-1582, deeply contemplative, highly active and practical, established Carmelite convents under a reformed rule, and wrote much on prayer and the spiritual life. Patron of lace-makers, and headache sufferers.

Paul prays that the Faithful may come to full knowledge of the saving plan, to know in their minds and hearts the hope held out to them.

St Hedwig, 1174-1243, wife of the Duke of Silesia, mother of seven children, some of whom caused her trouble, devoted herself to charitable works.

St Margaret Mary, 1647-1690, visionary and ascetic, revived devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus, exemplary in her patience and trust.

St. Gall was a monk of Bangor who set out with Columbanus for the Continent. When Columbanus was exiled from France, Gall accompanied him to Bregenz on Lake Constance. When Columbanus crossed into Italy, Gall remained in Switzerland. He lived in a hermitage, which later became the monastery of St. Gallen. He died around 630.

St Luke was a physician from a Gentile Christian milieu. He was with St Paul on his second missionary journey and during his imprisonment in Rome. Represented in art by an ox. Patron of butchers, book-binders, doctors and surgeons, artists, glass-workers.

19 Saturday Eph. 1:15-23. Ps. 8. Lk. 12:8 12. Lect II:824

Paul prays that the faithful may come to full knowledge of the saving plan, to know in their minds and hearts the hope held out to them, to recognise the Body which has Christ as the Head.

St Paul of the Cross, 1694-1775, founded the Passionists in Rome, preaching on the Passion of Christ and tending the sick, the dying and the lapsed.

Sts John de Brebeuf and Isaac Jogues, with their six Jesuit companions, were slain by Huron and Iroquois Indians in 1647/8.

THE VOICE OF THE LEGION OF MARY AFRICA



KENYA

The work of legionaries has resulted in patients receiving the last Sacraments before death, couples having their marriages validated in church, 560 people taking instruction in the faith and 71 people encouraged to quit the habit of abuse of alcoholic drink.

TANZANIA

Street girls are contacted, the sick and elderly are visited and teaching of catechism is undertaken.

ZAMBIA

Twenty-three conversions are reported in the Chipata area where a three day retreat was also organised.

THE SUDAN

After a long silence, word was received from the Tombura-Yambio diocese to say that there are, 2,338 active members in the Legion there as well as 430 members in a refugee camp. The poor, sick, orphans and prisoners are visited, despite much hardship.

NIGERIA

Enugu report 1,784 conversions, 12 legion groups started, 680 families had their homes consecrated to the Sacred Heart of Jesus and the Immaculate Heart of Mary. Ten legionaries were ordained priests and ten others deacons. In the areas of Ikot Ekpene, Benin Gty, Ibadan and Kaduna reports were received of many returns to the sacraments, conversions to the Church and marriages.

UGANDA

In order to counteract the efforts of Pentecostals in Kampala young legionaries organise Scripture study classes to good effect. In Luzira prison there are now three Legion groups established among the prisoners resulting in a much-improved situation between prisoners and staff. Fourteen legionaries were ordained priests and 17 deacons.

ROAD BUILDING COMPANY HELPS PARISH

As a result the Company has removed the unsightly stone fence to the rear of the parish cemetery bearing the full cost of the operation. The Management of Westside Retail Park have given the Parish Council permission to go on their ground west of the pallisade fencing to clean it up. As this newly cleared land is not the property of the parish it cannot be used as a cemetery extension. However the clearing will enhance the appearance of the

parish cemetery and will allow room for the erection of some form of central memorial to the Dead such as a Cross or statue.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

15 - OCTOBER - 02

ST. TERESA OF AVILA

In every age women of extraordinary holiness appear in the Church. The saint of our time is undoubtedly Mother Theresa of Calcutta renowned for her humility, service of the poor, personal poverty, kindness and holiness.

St. Teresa of Avila was such a woman in her time which spanned the middle of the sixteenth century. Born in 1515, she died in 1558 at the age of sixty seven. The city of Avila is located in central Spain, not far from the capital Madrid.

As a young person, Teresa wasn't all that interested in religion. She preferred romantic novels and beautiful clothes. When she entered the convent, it was like a club for young women filled with gossip, games and good food. After twenty years of this easy going convent life she wanted more.

She yearned for a place where the real Carmelite life would be lived - with prayer, silence and fasting. She set about creating such a place for herself. She founded such a convent at Avila at the age of forty seven. Further foundations followed all across Spain.

There was no shortage of vocations to this life of austerity.

St. Teresa is remembered not only for her work in reforming convent life but also for her writings which related her personal mystical experiences.

She was the first woman to be known as a doctor of the Church.

Questions

Q. What is the position of the Church regarding cremation?

A. The Church teaches us to show deep respect for the body of the dead, regarding it as a consecrated temple of the Holy Spirit, destined for sharing in the splendour of the final resurrection. Traditionally, the burial of the body has been regarded as one of the corporal works of mercy. Our Canon Law recommends that the pious custom of burial be retained; but it does not forbid cremation, provided that this does not demonstrate a denial of faith in the resurrection of the body.

Q. What does the title 'pope' mean? Is it true that there were very sinful popes?

A. The word 'pope' comes from papa, meaning father or authority figure in the family. The first was Simon Peter, to whom Jesus promised the keys of authority. Jesus chose the name, Peter, meaning a rock, the foundation rock of his Church.

There have been 268 popes to date. Perhaps three were notoriously sinful. One bad pope is one too many, yet it's not a bad record. Jesus promised that the powers of hell would never conquer his Church. Trust his word rather than the prophets of doom.

THE SUNDAY READINGS

FIRST READING: Is. 5: 1 - 7.

The prophet depicts the kingdom that the promised Messiah will institute as a rich banquet for all nations, united together on Mount Sion, as a kingdom of peace and happiness free from bloodshed and oppression.

All will form one united nation. a The removal of death probably means the cessation of wars and bloodshed, usually coupled with freedom from oppression.

SECOND READING: Phil. 4: 12-14, 19-20.

In this affectionate ending to his letter to the Christians of the Greek city of Philippi, St. Paul compliments them on their willingness to share his hardships. God will reward them for their kindness.

GOSPEL: Matt. 22: 1-4

This parable is addressed not to the Jewish leaders alone but to all and relates to the personnel of the Kingdom. The distinguished ones favoured with an invitation refuse, those of no distinction take their places. But even among these some are unworthy and so excluded. It was usual in the East to remind invited guests when the time drew near. With great forbearance the King overlooks the refusal and sends a second group of servants to say that the feast stands waiting, but the invited are more interested in their worldly cares.

Not content with insulting the servants they actually murder them. This is a reference to prophets like

John the Baptist who was not only ignored but murdered.

The king's patience is at last exhausted and his revenge terrible.
