#### Living with Dying

A Letter from the Irish Bishops to mark the Day for Life

Dying is Woven into Life

As a nation, we Irish probably go to more funerals than most people. In that sense, death is familiar to us; it is woven into the very pattern of our daily lives. But when we are faced with the death of a family member, or indeed our own death, it is a radically different experience. It brings with it a strange mixture of feelings: fear and hope, sadness and surprise, intimacy and isolation. It can also bring about a radical change in the lives of those who are left behind.

God is the giver of life, and he alone has the right to decide when that life should end. A summary of this important letter is given on page 5.

The Mission Sunday Theme is "launch out into the deep" The readings are taken from this current Sunday Lect 1: 714 except for the Gospel which is from Lect 1: 852. "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit" (Mt 28:19). The missionary mandate accompanies us into the Third Millennium and urges us to share the enthusiasm of the very first Christians: we can count on the power of the same Spirit who was poured out at Pentecost and who impels us still today to start out anew, sustained by the hope "which does not disappoint" (Rom 5:5) Novo Millennio Ineunte. Pope John Paul II. 2001

21 Monday Eph. 2:1 - 10. Ps. 99. Lk. 12:13-21.. Lect II:826 The very same power that God exercised on Christ, he has also put to work on the faithful. We are God's work of art. Let us indeed make ourselves rich in the sight of God.

22 Tuesday Eph. 2:12-22. Ps. 84. Lk. 12:35-38. Lect II:828 Christ is our peace, making Jew and Gentile one. **BI Thaddeus McCarthy** was born in 1455. His appointment as Bishop of Ross was opposed and Innocent VIII then appointed him bishop of Cork ond Cloyne. He set out as a humble pilgrim to Rome where he was confirmed as bishop of Cork and Cloyne. On his return journey in 1492 he died at Ivrea in Italy

## THE VOICE OF THE LEGION OF MARY

#### **ASIA**

#### **TAIWAN**

Efforts were made to set up the Legion in the Catholic university and among migrant workers. Non-christian families are visited at times of bereavement.

#### HONG KONG

Catechism is taught, contacts with people are made on streets, in trains, parks and at book fairs. Gatherings are arranged for the newly Baptised to encourage them in their faith.

#### **SINGAPORE**

Young people are meeting other young people by arranging Masses for them including in the lead-up to examinations. There are 12 Patricians (discussion) groups organised monthly discussing items of religious interest.

#### JAPAN

Osaka: Legion groups reporting had memberships of 23 and 26 visiting the sick, the aged and those lapsed from the faith.

#### **KOREA**

Re-organisation of dioceses in the Seoul area may also necessitate reorganisation of the Legion structure there. Meetings for young people in the 20-30 age group are being organised with expected attendances of 1,000. Because the Legion is so strong numerically there is a widespread apostolate undertaken resulting in many thousands of people being brought into the Church. In one area, 2,591 were received into the Church and 1,760 returned to the sacraments. In the Kwangju area, 500 were baptised and 800 were enrolled as catechumens. In another area, 1,000 baptisms took place at one ceremony.

#### **SUMMARY**

#### Palliative Care avoids two extremes

Advances in medicine and in technology mean that the taking of decisions about appropriate care for people who have advanced and progressive illness have become more complex. The document says that, in caring for people who are dying, there are two extremes to be avoided:

- a. Trying to keep people alive at all costs, even when it is clear that death is imminent
- b. Deciding to end the life of a person on the basis that his or her life no longer worth living. (pp. 5-6) Palliative care avoids both of these extremes "in that it upholds absolute respect for human life, and acknowledges human mortality and the dominion we have over life" It is about "maximising the quality of life remaining, while enabling patients to 'live until they die.' (p. 7)

#### Euthanasia is not acceptable

Euthanasia is any action or omission, which is deliberately calculated to end the life of another human being, with or without that person's consent, on so-called health grounds. (pp 7-8). Euthanasia is morally unacceptable not only because it "would mean the introduction of a qualitative judgement on what is determined to be a worthwhile life or existence," but also because it "would have an enormous effect on the ethos of healthcare provision." (p. 12)

"The Catholic Church absolutely rejects Euthanasia as a response to chronic or serious illness. This rejection is rooted in an understanding of the human person as someone who is called into life by God, and the ultimate meaning of whose life is to be found in relationship with God." (p. 19)

#### The Rights and Responsibilities of Healthcare Professionals

The document points out that healthcare professionals, although they act on behalf of the patient, are not just functionaries who are required to do whatever they are asked to do. They have a right and a duty to choose what is good, and to reject any course of action which conflicts with an informed judgement of conscience, even if this is requested by the patient or by the family." (p. 13)

#### Appropriate Pain Relief is not Euthanasia

The document uses the traditional Principle of Double Effect to explain that necessary pain relief, even if it sometimes results in an unintended and unavoidable reduction in the length of life is not euthanasia. The degree to which life is shortened must not be out of proportionate to the benefits which come to the patient through pain relief.(p. 9)

#### **Euthanasia is not Necessary**

The document points out that requests for euthanasia frequently coincide with a bad period of symptom control, even a clinically treatable depression.(p 10) The solution, in part, is to improve pain control. In the vast majority of cases unbearable pain can be avoided.

Some distress is not directly related to physical pain, but has its roots in issues such as "fear, anxiety, loss of control and loss of independence." Good counselling, which is an integral part of palliative care "allows the patient, the family, and others who are closely involved to discuss these fears. " (p. 15) Sedation may sometimes be required to deal with high levels of anxiety, but it should not be a first resort. While it can certainly help to reduce the experience of emotional stress, it also reduces the capacity of the patient to respond freely and deliberately to what is happening in his/her life." (p. 15)

(Sedation is not the same as physical pain-relief; sedation deals with emotional distress).

#### **The Provision of Resources**

The document makes a very strong case for the provision of adequate resources for palliative care, not only in hospices, but in general hospitals and in the community.

"The inadequacy of such resources impinges directly on the quality of care that can be provided to those who are dying, and may be a contributory factor in the level of demand for euthanasia. (p. 16)

#### **Spiritual and Sacramental Ministry**

The document points out that "a comprehensive approach to healthcare must take account of the spiritual needs of the patient." (p 20) All the key moments of life, including sickness and death, have the capacity to bring our relationship with God into sharper focus. Poor communication is an obstacle to spiritual care, because patients are often discouraged from even mentioning the possibility of death. By contrast, the ethos of sensitive but honest communication that is part of palliative care greatly facilitates the spiritual and sacramental care of those who are dying; the patient's questions are welcomed and answered appropriately. Talk of death and dying is not taboo. This means that if people pray with the patient, they can pray more honestly too." (p.21)

### SAINT OF THE WEEK 25 - OCTOBER - 02

#### BLESSED THADDEUS McCARTHY

Thaddeus McCarthy was appointed Bishop of Cork & Cloyne in 1490.

He was opposed by a rival claimant. Thaddeus made the long journey to Rome to appeal for justice. The Pope gave him a document ordering his restoration as Bishop.

He then set off home travelling incognito as a pilgrim.

Worn out by his travels and sufferings, he died in a pilgrim hospice at Ivrea in Piedmont on October 24th in circumstances which at once established his reputation for sanctity. As he lay dying his bed 'appeared all aflame and on fire without being consumed in any way'. The Bishop of Piedmont discovered the identity of the pilgrim from the Papal document and the bishop's ring he had hidden among his poor belongings. The body was vested in episcopal robes and buried in the Cathedral church of Ivrea.

He was beatified in 1896 and one of his bones is preserved in the beautiful ossuary in Cork's newly renovated Cathedral.

### **Questions**

## Q. What is so special about devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus? Where did the devotion come from?

A. The heart is the centre of love, so this devotion is a way to focus on the love of God shown in Jesus Christ. The devotion was popularised by Saint Margaret Mary Alocoque in the 17th century. It counteracted the very severe idea of God then being spread by Calvinism. Margaret Mary was asked to draw people back to the love in Christ's heart: his love for the Father, his mercy to sinners and his compassion to the sick.

'Behold this heart which has so loved people and is so little loved in return.'

## Q. Publicans today are people who own pubs, but who were the publicans in the Gospel?

A. Publicans were people who collected public taxes and excise duty. These minor officials didn't set the tax rates; their job was to collect the revenues. It was never a popular job, especially when the revenue went to an occupying power, the Romans. Sometimes they got a bad name for extortion and lining their own pockets, hence the link between publicans and sinners. Yet Jesus went made a point of befriending them and honoured their profession by calling Matthew to be an apostle.

### THE SUNDAY READINGS

FIRST READING: Is. 45: 1.4 - 6

One of the lowest periods in the history of God's people was the Babylonian captivity. The Babylonians not only conquered the Holy Land but also took the people away as slaves to Babylon. However, this suffering brought them closer to God. They kept their faith. The met on the Sabbath day to praise God by the rivers of Babylon. Eventually God answered their prayers. The political scene changed when Cyrus, King of Persia, conquered Babylon and allowed the Jewish exiles to return to Palestine. Isaiah sees this political change as the hand of God working even through pagans.

#### SECOND READING: 1 Thess. 1: 1 - 5

Here begins another one of Paul's letters; this time to the converts to Christianity in Thessalonica, the modern Salonika and capital of Macedonia. During Paul's visit to that city he converted so many Greek pagans to the Faith that the Jews began a persecution of the new Christians. In the introduction to this letter, Paul praises them for their courage in the face of persecution.

#### GOSPEL: Lk. 5: 1 - 11


As in the capturing of fish, so in the capturing of men for God's Kingdom, God's way will be found at variance with human standards. This is a lesson that Peter and the other Apostles were very slow to learn. The wisdom of the fisherman, Peter, - "Master, we worked hard all night and caught nothing", is proved wrong by the greater wisdom of the Son of God - "Put out into deep water and pay out your nets". So often we tell ourselves today that the Church of Christ has a bleak future. So often these sentiments were expressed in the past only to be proved wrong by a miraculous religious revival.


