

SECOND SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME - WEEK OF PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY

The call of God comes in different ways. To Samuel it came by night, mysterious, uncertain. To Andrew it came as an invitation from Jesus 'Come and see'. Whatever our vocation (and we all have one) our response must always be 'Speak Lord. Your servant is listening'.

CHRISTIAN UNITY

Normally at Mass we pray not only for Catholics in Ireland but for those throughout the world, in particular those in in Mission countries. On this weekend we are asked to pray for non-Catholics that there will be unity between ourselves and our non-Catholic brothers and sisters.

Let no one ever doubt the commitment of the Catholic Church to the pursuit of the unity of Christians. In the past I have spoken of the intolerable scandal of division between Christians. I have said that the movement towards unity must not stop until it reaches its goal. These words were spoken by Pope John Paul II at the ecumenical meeting in Dublin during his Irish visit back in 1979. How far have we, in Ireland, travelled on the road to unity in the past 23 years?

Though we rejoice today, there is a reason for sorrow too, two reasons in fact. Firstly the great number of non-Christians throughout the world who have not pledged loyalty to Christ in any way whatever. The proportion of non-Christians in the world has been growing steadily larger in recent decades. Secondly, in a sense a cause for even greater sorrow is the fact that there is disunity among the followers of Jesus Christ. There is separation between millions of Catholic, Protestant & Orthodox peoples.

Disunity is a scandal, a disgrace which damages the credibility and the spreading of belief in Christ to many parts of the world. If there seems to be a Catholic Christ and a protestant Christ of some 3000 varieties, which one should the pagan believe in?

In St. John's gospel, we are told that Jesus prayed for unity among his disciples 'so that the world may believe'.

Thank God, however, the picture is not one of total gloom and sadness. These past few years have witnessed a remarkable hungering for a return to unity. A strong movement towards unity among Christians exists among Protestants. A strong ecumenical spirit has been stirring within the Catholic Church in recent years. Gradually Catholics and Protestants are realising that we have much more in common than we thought. In fact, we are finding that the things which we have in common are much more important than anything historical which divides us. The most important unifying fact is that we have all been saved by Christ.

So this weekend in a spirit of Christian Unity, we pray for the day, when in God's good time, Christ's prayer for unity among his followers will be answered.



St Sebastian, born in Narbonne, became a Roman soldier in 283. He secretly helped Christians in the persecution of Diocletian. Was eventually betrayed and sentenced to be shot to death by arrows. When this failed, he was clubbed to death. Patron of archers, athletes, soldiers and police.

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THE SUNDAY READINGS

FIRST READING: 1 Samuel 3: 3-10,19
Like John the Baptist, Samuel was born when his mother thought she would never have a child. She dedicated him to the service of God in the Temple where he received his special calling from God.
This extract recounts the moment of that calling and states that the Lord remained with him in a special way all his life.

SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians, 6: 13-15, 17-20 St. Paul explains the foundations of Christian chastity. The human body made for God must not be debased for present pleasure. The body is eternal and should be respected. The popular modern sentiment: "my body is my own" is contradicted by Paul who says: "You are not your own property; you have been bought and paid for." Jesus bought and paid for us with his own blood shed on Calvary.

GOSPEL: John 1: 35-42

This is the moment when the Church began to find its Saviour. The solemnity and grace of the simple narrative are equal to the occasion: John the Baptist standing, two disciples nearby. The disciples follow Jesus.

The heavenly attraction had begun to exercise its power. Jesus turned and gazed on the two men following him and spoke the first words from the lips of the Saviour reported by St. John: a "What do you want?". That same question is asked of all of us who follow Jesus: "Why do we follow him? What is it that we seek?

SAINT OF THE WEEK

ST. AGNES - JANUARY 21

During the first century Christianity was, in the eyes of the Romans, confused with Judaism which was a legally permitted religion. Because of that there were few persecutions. When Christianity was better understood as a belief incompatible with pagan ideas charges were brought against Christians. They were seen as dangerous to the Emperor and the State. Trajan ordered that those who refused to offer sacrifice to the pagan gods should be executed. From then until the Edict of Milan in 313 A.D. there were ten major persecutions of Christians in which many faced terrible torture and martyrdom. St. Agnes died in one of these. St. Agnes was only thirteen or fourteen years of age when an Imperial Edict was promulgated against Christians. She immediately voluntarily declared herself a Christian and suffered torture by fire before being decapitated by the sword. Around her tomb grew up a large catacomb that bore her name. The original slab that covered her remains is now in the museum at Naples. On the feast of St. Agnes two lambs are solemnly blessed and from their wool are made the "palliums" or white stoles that are sent by the Pope to Archbishops throughout the world on their appointment to that high office.

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
