ALL SAINTS

Many people have a false idea of what a Saint is. For them, Saints are people who:

- ? Never committed a sin in their lives;
- ? Were always shining with virtue;
- ? Strong willed, humble, pure, who never lost their patience;
- ? Who never thought of themselves, but always of God and others.

This is a mistaken idea. It implies that the Saints were not born. They became Saints, undergoing a conversion – a change of heart that resulted in a change of life. This change did not happen overnight, but was the result of a long and painful struggle.

The change of heart that we call conversion (which every Saint underwent) is very clearly seen in the lives of some of the greatest names in the Church's register of Saints: Francis of Assisi; Augustine of Hippo; Paul of Tarsus; Joan of Arc; each of these at a certain moment in their lives heard the words of Christ:

"Repent and believe the Good News".

This is why the lives of the Saints, the "little ones" as well as the "big ones", are such a great challenge to us. We cannot read about them without experiencing a great call to conversion – a call to rethink our basic attitudes to life, to redefine our goals, to confront our sinfulness and to throw ourselves open to God's mercy and love.

To become a Saint is to become real. It means that the real me, which is often hidden under layers of foolishness and absurd pretence, finally emerges. All the hidden goodness and beauty that God has placed within me comes out. It all starts with the realisation that God loves me as I am. The Saints were people who believed the Good News of God's unconditional love and who began to return his love, and found their lives changed, not overnight, but through a gradual process of growth which did not rule out further falls.

In some cases (e.g. St. Peter) it took a long time. A lot of corners had to knocked off before they became real. We all want something for nothing, quickly and without working for it. But it cannot be. As this was happening to them, the Saints discovered a tremendous joy and freedom. May we all be inspired by the example of the Saints and be helped, by their prayers, as we strive for Holiness in our lives.

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THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: Isaiah 25:6-9

Even in the time of the Old Testament, Scripture spoke of life after death. Indeed, we understand suffering as a means of purification. We who believe know that in heaven there is no pain, no torment, and no tribulation.

Second Reading: Rom 5:5-11

Paul teaches that Christ has given us a victory; sin and death are conquered. That's the connection. Anyone who turns away from sin has the key to eternal life.

Gospel: Mark 15:33-339; 16:1-6

Jesus explained to the crowds that God had sent him. He said it was God's will that those who believed in Jesus should not be turned away in the final days. Those who have come to Jesus will be given eternal life. They will be raised up on the last day.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

St. Charles Borromeo 04-November-2003

After the Protestant Reformation which, inspired by Martin Luther and others, had divided the Church in the sixteenth century the Catholic Church in a sense turned in on itself in order to carry out a complete reformation which came to be known as the Counter Reformation. The Bishop of Milan, Charles Borromeo became one of the leading figures in this movement. Descended from powerful Families such as the Medici's he spent the first part of his life involved in Vatican and Italian politics being especially involved in the Council of Trent. It was the experience of Trent that changed his life. He was ordained priest and later Bishop. He helped produce the catechism embodying the teachings of Trent which became the basis for religion teaching down to our own day. Charles began a major reform of the clergy of Milan, an undertaking that called for skill and tact. The Confraternity of Christian Doctrine was organised which is still functioning in many countries such as the U.S.A. where it is known as "Sunday School". Suffering great physical hardship he travelled around Switzerland on a mule trying to inspire both clergy and laity to reform their lives where scandal and corruption had replaced religious fervour. Back in Italy he was met by violent opposition to his reforms; on one occasion he was injured by an assassin's gunshot. In 1576 the plague struck Milan. With great courage Charles devoted himself to the care of the sick and dying. Just eight years later death took the Saint himself. For a Church in so much difficulty in our time, St. Charles Borromeo is both a model and an inspiration.
