THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: Amos 8:4-7 We are called to act with justice.

Second Reading: 1 Timothy 2:1-8

Paul reminds us to think of others and to pray for them.

Gospel: Luke 16:1-13

At first, it would seem that this Gospel passage praises dishonesty, but in fact, it gives credit for a clever and quick response. There was a man who managed the land for his master. What his misdeeds were not quite clear, but something had gone wrong in their relationship and the manager was about to be fired. Not physically able to dig ditches and too proud to beg, the manager worried about how he would live. In a quick response, he went to all the people who owed his master produce and had them change their bills to reflect a lesser amount. In this way, the people who saved money would welcome the manager into their homes once he had been fired. The master wasn't rewarding the manager for his dishonesty, but for his cleverness and quick thinking. The point Jesus wanted to make with this parable was to let the crowd know that they should be wise in their use of the world's goods, because if they are used selfishly, they will fail us. However, if we share our resources with others, true wealth will await us in the Kingdom. The final point of Jesus' words was that we cannot serve two masters, God and money.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

Padre Pio 23-September-2004

Francesco Forgione was born to a southern Italian farm family, the son of Grazio, a shepherd. At age 15 he entered the novitiate of the Capuchin Friars in Morcone, and joined the order at age of 19. Suffered several health problems, and at one point his family thought he had tuberculosis. He was ordained priest at the age of 22 on 10th August 1910.

While praying before a cross, he received the stigmata on 20th September 1918, the first priest ever to be so blessed. As word spread, especially after American soldiers brought home stories of Padre Pio following the Second World War, the priest himself became a point of pilgrimage for both the pious and the curious. He would hear confessions by the hour, reportedly able to read the consciences of those who held back. Reportedly able to bi-Iocate, levitate, and heal by touch. He founded the House for the Relief of Suffering in 1956, a hospital that serves 60,000 a year. In the 1920's he started; a series of prayer groups that continue today with over 400,000 members worldwide. He died 23rd September 1968 of natural causes "The life and mission of Padre Pio prove that difficulties and sorrows, if accepted out of love, are transformed into a privileged way of holiness, which opens onto the-horizons of a greater good, known only to the Lord.

The ultimate reason for the apostolic effectiveness of Padre Pio, the profound root of so much spiritual fruitfulness can be found in that intimate and constant union with God attested to by his long hours spent in prayer and in the confessional. He loved to repeat; 'I am a poor Franciscan who prays' convinced that "prayer is the best weapon we have, a key that opens the heart of God ". This fundamental characteristic of his spirituality continues in the 'Prayer Group's' that he founded, which offer to the Church and to society the wonderful contribution of incessant and confident prayer."
