

Mission Sunday

The call to be a missionary in the church is more than two thousand years old and was made by Christ; "The Lord appointed seventy - two others and sent them out ahead of him in pairs, to all the towns and villages he himself was to visit.- - - - Whatever house you go into, let your first words be peace to this house." Lk 10; 1-4. The seventy - two may have been surprised to be invited to take a lead role as missionaries. We live in the age of the professional so there is a possibility that we conveniently leave the missionary work of the church to the professionals also, whether they are the sisters, brothers or priests. Remember the Lord sent out the seventy two and depends on each of us to contribute our part, whether as parents, sisters, brothers or sons and daughters we can also let our first words be "Peace to this house."

Monday night during the parish council meeting as we wondered and questioned our role in the parish of Ballincollig some members suggested that council members have a particular responsibility to reveal the face of Christ to our family, neighbours and also to those we meet casually while shopping or driving.

The society for the Propagation of the Faith was founded in 1822 by a French laywoman, Pauline Jaricot. She wished to help not only French missions and missionaries but all missionaries, especially the poorest. The basic plan of the Society as drawn up by Pauline is one of prayer, offering of suffering and making a financial contribution for the spread of the Faith. In 1922 the society became the primary organisation of the Church for supporting the activity of missionaries. Pope Pius X1 instituted Mission Sunday in 1926 and ordered that it be observed in all churches and oratories throughout the world as a day of prayer and material support for missionary activity.

Last Sunday the parishioners of Ballincollig generously helped the missions by giving seventeen hundred euro in the envelope collection. Well done to everybody for your generosity.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

The Forty Martyrs of England and Wales 25-October-2004

These forty were canonised by Pope Paul VI on October 25th 1970. They are representative of the English and Welsh martyrs of the Reformation who died at various dates between 1535 and 1679. Some 200 of these martyrs had already been declared 'Blessed' (i.e. 'beatified') by previous Popes. They include SS. John Houghton, Robert Lawrence and Augustine Webster, the first martyrs (1535), all priors of different Charterhouses (houses of the Carthusian Order, including the one in London) who, by virtue of the Carthusian vow of silence, refused to speak in their own defence; St. Cuthbert Mayne, a Devonian, who was the first martyr not to be a member of a religious order. He was ordained priest at the then newly established English College at Douai in Northern France and was put to death at Launceston in 1577; St. Edmund Campion, the famous Jesuit missionary and theologian who published secretly from Stonor Park, the ancient Catholic country house near Henley-on-Thames, who died in 1581 on the same day as St. Ralph Sherwin, the first martyr to have been trained at the English College in Rome; St. Richard Gwyn, the first of the Welsh martyrs, a schoolteacher from Llanidloes in Mid-Wales who died at Wrexham in 1584; St. Margaret Clitherow, the wife of a butcher with a shop in the famous Shambles in York, who allowed her house to be used as a Mass centre, who was sentenced to be crushed to death under a large stone at the Ouse Bridge Tollbooth in the city; St. Swithun Wells, a teacher from Brambridge in this county of Hampshire who owned a London house at Gravs Inn Fields which was also a secret Mass centre (1591); St. Philip Howard, eldest son of the fourth Duke of Norfolk (himself executed for treason in 1572) who led a dissolute existence and left behind an unhappy wife in Arundel Castle until he was converted by the preaching of St. Edmund Campion, and died in the Tower in 1595; and St. Nicholas Owen, Jesuit lay brother and master carpenter, who constructed many priests' hiding-holes in houses up and down the country, some of them so cunningly concealed they were not discovered until centuries later (1606). Under James I and Charles I the purge died down, but did not entirely cease. St. John Southworth, missionary in London, was put to death under Cromwell and is venerated in Westminster Cathedral, and the final martyrs died in the aftermath of the Titus Oates plot in 1679.

Carbon Monoxide The Silent Killer

Carbon Monoxide (CO) is invisible, tasteless and odourless. Exposure to relatively low levels of this highly poisonous gas can cause brain damage or even death. Symptoms of CO poisoning are similar to those of viral infections and can include pains in the chest, weakness, nausea, tiredness, convulsions, drowsiness and even unconsciousness.

If you suspect carbon monoxide might be in your environment, you should turn off the heater or source of the gas, open windows to ventilate all rooms or go outside and get some fresh air. If in a vehicle, switch off engine and remove yourself or the person from the vehicle. Seek emergency medical assistance. When inhaled, carbon monoxide is quickly absorbed into the blood. It displaces oxygen by combining with the blood's oxygen carrying molecule, haemoglobin, with a bond 240 times stronger than oxygen's.

Never allow anyone who is not registered to carry out any gas-related work. Unregistered installers are breaking the law by carrying out gas related work as no one checks their work to ensure that it meets the strict safety requirements. Do not compromise your family's safety.

An additional way of protecting from the risks involving Carbon Monoxide emissions is to purchase a carbon monoxide detector. Remember these detectors are only a second line of defence, you must always ensure that your gas appliances are properly maintained each year by a registered gas installer.

Possible Danger areas in your home include:

Gas, coal or wood fires. Boiler or heat exchanger. Clogged chimney or flue. Car fumes from garage. Water heater.

Portable gas or paraffin heaters. Portable cooking equipment used indoors. Kitchen Cooker.
