Welcome to Advent 2004, this marks the beginning of another church year. Advent is a period of four weeks when the church asks us to wait for the Saviour. During each week we spend some time waiting; sometimes for the bus, on other occasions for that phone call, parents wait for the children, many will wait for that hoped for card during the coming weeks but as Christians we are asked to wait for Emanuel – not easy to wait so we might ask for help with our waiting.

The readings this weekend carry a message of hope. The desire to reach forward to grasp a better future is an intrinsic part of human nature. Without such a desire no one would make plans of any kind. This aspect of our nature persists even if we expect that the future will contain its share of difficulty, even agony, fear or pain. Hope is not confined to personal life. The idealism that prompts people to see to build a new and better world is the product of human willingness to put energies into building the future. Part of the contribution that Christian hope makes is the belief that the future is of God's making.

The enemies of hope are many, there can be a tendency to look back, to wallow in a supposedly golden age when all was in order; there is a danger also of being prophets of doom. Today we might listen to St. Paul's call "the time has come, you must wake up now; the night is almost over. Let us arm ourselves and appear in the light." May this Advent be a time when we will try to wait, wait for the Saviour to come to each of us and our families.

THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: Isaiah 2:1-5

The Prophet Isaiah speaks of a time when all the nations will hear the Word of God and be united.

Second Reading: Romans 13:11-14

St. Paul issues a wake-up call for this Advent season.

Gospel: Matthew 24:37-40, 44.

The emphasis of today's Gospel is on the second coming of Jesus. Matthew refers to three events that show we do not know when Jesus will return, but the message is clear: we are to be ready! The first reference Matthew makes is to Noah and the flood. People were occupied with their daily lives / eating, drinking, and marrying. In the second example, men were working in the field and women were grinding at the mill. Some were taken and some remained. In the final example, the master of the house could have prevented the robbery if only he had known when the thief would come. This Gospel is a stern caution for each of us to live in preparation for Jesus' return.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

St. Francis Xavier 3-December-2004

St. Francis Xavier: 1506-1552, one of the first seven Jesuits. He was sent to India by St Ignatius. It is extraordinary that one man in the space of ten years could have visited so many countries, preached the Gospel to so many nations and converted so many infidels. His initial journey from Lisbon to Goa in a sailing ship was in itself a tremendous undertaking. From India he travelled on to the island of Ceylon. In 1549 Francis Xavier landed in Japan where he spent a year learning the language. When he was able to express himself he began preaching Christianity but the political authorities had him expelled from the city. Bravely he continued to preach in other Japanese cities and towns building up the nucleus of a Christian community. During this time he heard much of the Celestial Empire of China and eventually he arrived on a small island off the coast of that great empire. While planning the best means of reaching the mainland he was taken ill and died in a rude hut built to shelter him. In these wretched surroundings, the greatest missionary since St. Paul passed to his reward.

A native of the Basque country, born in the castle of Xavier (or Javier) in Navarre, he met Ignatius of Loyola in Paris and was one of the original group who took vows in 1534 to form the beginnings of the Jesuits. In 1541 he sailed to Goa on the West coast of India, for many centuries a Portuguese colony, to evangelise the Indies. His journeys took him to Malaya and Ceylon; everywhere he lived a life of extreme simplicity and made many converts from low-caste natives, In 1549 he reached Japan and wanted to meet the Mikado, but tradition required that he offered a present which he could not possibly afford, so the meeting never took place until, with the support of his Order, he was able to come dressed in finery and with suitable gifts. He sowed the seeds of Japanese Christianity which in the 17th. Century were to grow and resist savage persecution. He longed to visit China, but fell ill and died in 1552 on the island of Chang-Shuen-Shan off the Chinese mainland. His shrine is in Goa, though some of his relics are in the Gesu in Rome. He was declared Patron Saint of the Foreign missions in 1927.

During the month of September the R.E. Department provided the opportunity for TY and LCA1 students to take time out of their busy schedule, by going on a day of retreat

Over the past number of years our Retreat days tended to be more in-house and formal, so it was decided this year to take a different and more prayerfully active approach to which end we decided to begin at Ballyvourney and to experience the 'Rounds' at St. Gobnait's settlement, which dates back to 7th Century AD and which holds onto several religious traditions. The 'Rounds' themselves take approx. 2 hours. This was a new and enriching experience for both students and teachers.

Once the rounds had finished it was then onto Gougane Barra where the outdoor celebration of the Eucharist took place. A brief explanation of St. Finbarr's (the first Bishop of Cork) settlement and the traditions attached therein were given to the students. It was enriching to see how the students genuinely took ownership of their day of retreat.
