Easter Sunday

Easter is one of my favourite times of the year, not only is it the time of year when the trees are budding and coming to life, all sorts of plants and bird life are awaking from winters sleep and these new beginnings in the world of nature give me fresh hope and the promise of new starts. Easter is that time of year when we celebrate Christ's triumph over death, poverty and violence. Easter is the time of year when we are reminded of the hope, richness and endless possibilities that Christ's resurrection affords us.

The Christ, whose resurrection we celebrate at Easter was attracted to the poor like steel to a magnet, was poor himself. He was poor in His origins and His birth, but even more so when he left behind the uncertain but more or less stable life of a village tradesman and took to wandering around the countryside with no job, home or income. Yet finally that was not even enough, for economic poverty symbolises the deeper poverty of human beings. The deepest poverty is the lack of God, and only a poor God could be vulnerable enough to share that, a God who' emptied himself and became' obedient even to death', as the poor have to be, who die young at the hands of others. The poor Christ is not only the wandering preacher who had nowhere to sleep unless someone took him in; he is above all the one who died young.

In a recent interview Dom Pedro, one of the most prophetic voices among the bishops of the church, describes his life "as an adventure that he sought and loved, an option for the poor and for Latin America. It has been one surprise after another, living my own contradictions and those of the Church. What has caused me most fear has been my own impotence, in the face of the injustice of the landowners, the massacre of the peasants, the inertia of the government. I was oppressed by my own impotence and by the fear of falling into depression. I was always aware that the cause was worth more than my life. Truly human causes are causes of Jesus, and are therefore mine also". What else could God dream for the human race?

THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: Acts of the Apostles 10:34, 37-43 Peter preached about Jesus' baptism, the anointing with the Holy Spirit, works of kindness and healing, and his crucifixion and resurrection from the dead. All who believe in him are forgiven.

Second Reading: Colossians 3:1-4

Think about what is above. When Christ appears, then you shall appear with him in glory.

Gospel: John 20:1-9

On Friday afternoon when Jesus died, the women had not been able to finish the customary preparation for burial. The Sabbath began at sundown on Friday, so Mary of Magdala hurried to the tomb Sunday morning to complete her task. She found the tomb empty. Certain that Jesus' body had been stolen, she ran back to get the other disciples. Peter and the other disciple also found an empty tomb but with Jesus' clothing rolled neatly and placed where his body had been. The disciples still didn't understand about the resurrection and Mary wept. As she cried, two angels appeared asking why she was crying. She then saw a gardener and asked him where the body might be. When he called her by name, Mary immediately recognised Jesus.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

St. Ceallach (Celsus) 01-April-2005

Celsus of Armagh was a layman named Ceallach mac Aedha. While a layman he succeeded to the hereditary bishopric of Armagh in 1105. Built a reputation as a reformer and able administrator. When he became Bishop of Armagh, he initiated a programme of church reform and travelled throughout Ireland, preaching reform and ensuring discipline. Helped preside at the Synod of Rath Bresail in 1111, which helped align the Irish church administration with the rest of Europe. Rebuilt the Armagh cathedral. Peacemaker between warring Irish kings and chieftains. Worked with, and ordained his friend of Saint Malachy O'More. From his deathbed, he appointed Malachy as Archbishop of Armagh, ending the tradition of hereditary succession to the see. He died in 1129 and is buried in Lismore.

He has Risen

Lord Jesus, by rising from the dead, you broke the power of death and opened the way for us to a life beyond all limitations, weaknesses, failures and evil. Stretch our minds and our hearts to understand the wonder of what we celebrate and fill us with the hope of risen life in the new creation.

Questions People Ask

Q. One hears of the paschal mystery, paschal time or the paschal season. What does paschal mean?

A. The word comes from the Hebrew name for the Jewish feast of Passover. Passover celebrated their liberation from the slavery of Egypt when the destroying angel passed over their houses and tents, which were marked with the blood of a Iamb. Then they safely passed over the Red Sea and escaped from slavery. It was at the time of the Passover that Jesus gave the feast a new meaning as he passed from this life, through death and resurrection, in returning to the Father. So, paschal refers to our journey of liberation through the death and resurrection of Jesus.
