We see him today as the Saviour, who cares for our immediate as well as our ultimate needs.

What do priests do all day?

When I calculated the time I worked in a recent week it was just shy of 60 hours! There are 2 daily weekday morning masses in the parish, one in each church. Add in extra masses for first Fridays, weddings and funerals and the weekly total has often gone as high as 15 masses in a week! But that is not all; Parish institutions like the 3 nursing homes and Westgate foundation also have regular masses and visits from the priests. (Not forgetting that the weekend mass schedule has a total of 8 masses!)

But the week isn't all about masses. Because the parish has a fast growing population, Baptisms too are numerous (annual average of 300), with ceremonies on Saturdays and Sundays. Once a booking is made parents are invited to a Pre Baptism talk. Saturdays are synonymous with weddings, especially in the summer. Up to 40 weddings a year are held in the parish. I estimate that each wedding takes a minimum of 8 hours work. From the initial booking, right through the prenuptial enquiry, form filling and other administration work, (calls, e-mails, organisation of all legal documentation) assisting the couple in planning their ceremony so that their day is personalised; the rehearsal and then actual wedding day. But there are also many hours of unseen work relating to weddings which are held elsewhere (i.e. Gougane Barra or The Honan), because the documentation process takes place in the parish of residence.

Funerals are intense and can be very moving as they are such emotionally charged times. It can be personally very draining making the emotional shift required when a funeral and a wedding occur on the one day, as is often the case. A death involves contacting the family, the rosary and removal, and then the funeral mass and burial. Sometimes a working day that begins at 8am doesn't end till 9pm. So it is very easy to have an unavoidable 13 hr day.

The 4 Primary schools in the parish require weekly visits, planning liturgies and celebration of sacraments at an age appropriate level for children. The teachers of the classes who will make first communion and confirmation need extra support and lots of preparation and planning has to be put into this work. This often involves night work with parents (enrolment celebrations etc). The priests also have a role in serving on/or nominating for Boards of Management.

As a team, all of the priests have a pastoral planning meeting every 2 weeks; just one of the many regular parish meetings. The Parish Pastoral Council and Finance committee meet regularly at night. Planning liturgies for the different seasons requires meetings with the many people in the parish who volunteer their gifts and talents. Those in parish ministries (Lectors, Ministers of Eucharist etc) need preparation and regular support (retreats, in-service days), all of which take time in planning and organising.

Appointments with people who need to discuss personal issues are often in the evenings and take a lot of time and energy. The sick and housebound are visited every month and sometimes more often, especially if close to death. Parishioners in hospital will be visited too if we are notified. Let's not forget time required for personal prayer and planning, researching and writing homilies for the weekend masses and the variety of other celebrations that occur in a typical week. (not forgetting the time to pen this column!)

The task of home visitation, as well as showing pastoral concern for bereaved families make other calls on our time. There are just 3 priests serving in the parish, and taking into account normal absences due to illness, family events, annual holidays, retreat and periodic in-service courses, it leaves the day to day running down to 2 priests for a large portion of the year.

So if you are breathless from reading this, you might wonder if there are great perks to our job? Our income is derived from the donations of parishioners received in the Dues envelopes twice yearly, plus offerings for Weddings, Baptisms, Mass stipends, and the collections at Christmas and Easter. The total brings us close to the average industrial wage or the starting salary for a teacher. Only in the context of vocation, responding to the Lord's call and the personal fulfilment it brings does it all make any sense.
