God's Love For Us

n to-days Readings we are reminded of God's great love for us. In the Gospel Jesus speaks about his imminent death - 'now the hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified'. He speaks of his turmoil and agony when he says 'now my soul is troubled'. The Letter to the Hebrews states: 'during his life on earth, he offered up prayers, aloud and in silent tears to the one who had the power to save him from death' Yet, Jesus lets go of everything, including his own life to 'become for all who obey him the source of eternal salvation'.

Because human life is so precious, perhaps our deepest human instinct is survival. All of us can be fearful and apprehensive facing suffering and even death. Just as Jesus in his agony asked the Father to 'save him from this hour', we too ask God to take away our suffering or we pray to him for the courage we need. Jesus' painful journey to Calvary gives us comfort and hope in our low moments. We are not alone. Jesus is there with us and knows what we are going through. He gives us strength to walk with him carrying our cross.

Jesus' death on the Cross shows how much he loves each one of us. We remember Fr Maximilian Kolbe (now a canonised saint) who lovingly offered his life by choosing to die instead of a young husband and father at the concentration camp at Auschwitz in 1941. In today's Gospel we are reminded that just as the grain of wheat has to die in order to bear fruit, so we must die to self if we are to bear fruit and live the fullness of life. While we may never have to offer our life for another like Fr Maximilian Kolbe, yet each one of us can ask ourselves in what areas of my life do I need to "die" to self? Do I like to cling to my own selfishness and comfort zones? 'Letting go' is not easy! God gives each of us the grace to 'bear fruit' and reject whatever is contrary to his loving plan for our lives.

Jesus is lifted up, not to end his life on the cross, but he is lifted up to eternal life with his Father. All of us who follow him in faith will also be with God. We ask Jesus to give us strength and courage on our Christian journey. Sr. Colette

TROCAIRE

The violence, deprivation and suffering in Darfur continues unabated. Conflict in the region has meant around 300,000 people may have died, forced nearly 2.7 million people from their homes, and left over 4 million people dependent on humanitarian food aid. Over the last three years, Trocaire has spent over €1.6 million meeting the needs of people forced from their homes by the conflict. Trocaire is also providing support to communities hosting those who have lost their homes. Working in a joint programme with other international faith-based agencies, Trócaire provides life-saving support to over 40,000 families.

In the Gospel today Jesus gives us a very simple message. He tells us that, "Whoever serves me must follow me". This means we are called in to total and compassionate solidarity with those whom Christ especially loved; the sick, the lonely, the dispossessed, those on the margins. Perhaps in our world today there is no group of people more marginalised that those who have been displaced as a result of conflict. In standing in solidarity with the displaced in our world we show ourselves to be followers of Christ.

THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: Jeremiah 31: 31-34

The prophet foretells the day when a new covenant will be made between God and man. Christ will be the new High Priest. Before him all men will be equal and the different religious beliefs will one day disappear, as all men will come to know the one true God.

Second Reading: Hebrews 5: 7-9

Gethsemane rather than Calvary is the scene here. Christ is presented in his weakness. Nowhere was Jesus more evidently one of our weak human selves than in the garden of Gethsemane where he suffered his agony of anticipation. Being innocent he could not offer sacrifice for his own sins like the High Priests in the Old Testament but he could pray out of the anguish of mortal weakness which he took on for our salvation.

Gospel: John 12: 20-30

The grain of wheat has life in it but that does not germinate into the production of other living grains unless it is subject to death and burial in the ground. Martyrdom is the highest act of self-denial. The cross frightens us, but it also frightened Jesus. The vivid image of a cruel death brought to Jesus a tremor of fear. Crucified, he will draw all people, without distinction of race, to himself.

Ballincollig Scouts

Recently a parent was describing to me her kitchen after a Macoimh weekend camp. Heaps of muddy washing lie on the kitchen floor. Down at the bottom are four pairs of clean underpants not needed? One nine year old goes wearily to bed, having walked further and slept less than ever before. Before parenthood she expected children to be mucky. When she became a parent more mundane concerns get in the way. She wondered did the leaders nag the child to clean his teeth properly before he went to bed, did they worry about whether he ate his greens and the possible effect on his I.Q. Do they eat greens themselves? Whether she likes it or not children are ambassadors for their families. They must be clean and tidy, because we are. They must be intelligent, because we are. They must be polite and healthy. The world must see that they are 'well brought up 'and if there is any doubt about it, from the moment of their conception, we are besieged by advice as to how to achieve this. We are in constant struggle against children's nature. Hence her anxiety on leaving her offspring in the care of a man who would keep him up till all hours, let him get his feet wet and not notice whether he changed his underpants. The theme for the camp was 'get mucky'. A couple of weeks later they went for a walk, her child forgetting that such themes do not apply to everyday life with mum, took like a duck to water to the first muddy puddle, before parenthood she might have laughed. Instinctively she would have known that muddy water does not cause illness in healthy boys. The Macoimh leaders know, her washing machine has seen the evidence more than once. So why was the day fouled by threats and anger on her part? Because this mixed-up series of emotions, the desire to protect, promote and subdue - called parenthood - got in the way. So she though here's to the leaders, don't worry about paying lip

So she though here's to the leaders, don't worry about paying lip service to parental concerns. Let him walk too far, eat too much and climb that tree. He'll be happier, stronger – and more independent. So long as she doesn't have to watch.

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
