The Bible and The Mass

In the introductory rites of the Mass we gather ourselves as God's people and then we listen to the Word of God. The Liturgy of the Word is a core part of our Mass as our minds and hearts are nourished by Sacred Scripture. Familiarity with Scripture helps us appreciate biblical allusions in the Mass prayers, to understand for example that in the New Covenant in Jesus' blood we become God's family, each becoming a beloved daughter or son. In the biblical world a "covenant" was a kinship agreement by which the parties became as family to each other, often ratified by sacrifice and a covenant meal. The new covenant is established at the Last Supper, and our Eucharist is still a "kinship meal" to ratify that covenant. All the promises of the Old Testament covenants with Adam, Noah, Abraham, Moses and David are fulfilled in Jesus and in the New Covenant in his blood. The Eucharist recalls many images in the Old Testament, including the bread and wine offered by Melchizedek and the offering of Isaac in the book of Genesis; the Passover in Egypt and the feeding of the children of Israel in the desert, recounted by the Book of Exodus; the banquet for all peoples in Chapter 29 of Isaiah.

In the Gospel for this Sunday we hear the story of the disciples on the Road to Emmaus. Their hearts burned within them as Jesus explained the scriptures to them, and they recognised him with at the breaking of bread. Listening to the scriptures came before the breaking of bread, the order we still follow at Mass. Pope John Paul II commented that the reason "the words of God...are like human language is so that they may be understood by all, they must not remain distant." Yet we have in our Irish Catholic tradition something of a sad biblical deficit, a lack of familiarity with the Bible, nearly fifty years after the second Vatican Council reminded us that "ignorance of Scripture is ignorance of Christ." We pray therefore that our hearts may be open to the Word of God when we hear it proclaimed at Mass so that we may be truly prepared to participate in our Sunday Eucharist. We pray also that the "words of God" referred to by Pope John Paul may become more and more familiar to us as we begin or continue to read our own Bibles at home.

THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: Acts of the Apostles 2:14, 22-33

Peter proclaimed that Jesus came with miracles, wonders, and signs so that people could know of God's love.

Second Reading: 1 Peter 1:17-21

The blood of Christ, as of the sinless, unblemished lamb, delivered believers.

Gospel: Luke 24:13-35

Despondent and discouraged, two of Jesus' apostles walked from Jerusalem to Emmaus. They talked on their way about the events that had occurred in the past several days. A stranger joined them, actually Jesus, but they didn't recognise him at first. Jesus asked the apostles what they had been discussing, and they responded with a summary of the events surrounding Jesus' death. The disciples still did not understand the resurrection, but Jesus questioned their resistance to believe what the prophets had foretold. Despite their hopelessness the apostles invited Jesus to stay with them. He accepted. It was that evening, when Jesus broke bread with them, that the disciples finally recognised the stranger to be Jesus. The next morning, the disciples returned to Jerusalem.

Evangelisation - May '11

What does it mean to evangelise in today's Ireland? Jesus said 'go and make disciples of all nations,' but it can be something we feel unsure about in our own parish.

The next Synod of bishops in Rome will take the theme of Evangelisation and all dioceses are asked to participate in a consultation. The results of our conversations will be included by Bishop Buckley in the response of the Irish Bishops' Conference. This theme will help to focus on how we share the Good News of Jesus with one another and others in our communities, and call us to the heart of the mission of the Church

Saint Vincent De Paul & Irish Association of Suicidology

Monday, May 2nd, 2011

The Society of St Vincent De Paul (SVP) has confirmed that it has received training from the Irish Association of Suicidology to enable its volunteers identify clients likely to be suffering from mental health problems.

In a statement SVP confirmed that the initiative started after the Irish Association of Suicidology (IAS) saw an article in a national newspaper last Christmas outlining the depths and complexity of the problems facing people assisted by the SVP due to the economic crisis in Ireland.

Following contact from the IAS to SVP Head Office, a joint training initiative was put in place and funding was secured for the initiative from the National Office of Suicide Prevention.

According to SVP this training initiative has provided mental health awareness training with the focus on three modules, the recession and suicide, identifying the warning signs in others, and understanding bereavement.

The training programme is tailored specifically to the needs of SVP volunteers and staff. The programme provides them with the skills to support clients in a more informed manner. It will also assist those training to take care of their own mental health in the course of their work. After a number of pilot sessions that were run on a regional basis the training is set to be run on a national basis in the coming weeks.



Free Handyman Service for Older People Are you 65+ years of age and living in Cork City and suburbs, Ballincollig, Kinsale, Carrigaline, Glanmire or Carrigtwohill? Do you have a small repair job that you would like to have done for you? Age Action's Care & Repair service uses a pool of trustworthy volunteer handypersons to carry out minor repairs and odd jobs for older people who find it difficult to do these jobs themselves.

Some of the jobs that our volunteers can do include changing light bulbs, changing locks, minor painting and decorating, hanging curtains, minor gardening, minor carpentry and installing smoke alarms. The service is free; you only pay for the materials used. For your bigger jobs that are beyond the scope of our volunteers, we maintain a register of reliable and honest tradespersons whose contact details we can provide for you. We can also arrange regular social visits to older people. All volunteers are Garda vetted and carry official Age Action identification cards. You can arrange to have a job done for you by phoning the Age Action Care & Repair number, 1890 369 369.
