The Kingdom of The Shepherd King

We celebrate the feast of Christ the King on this last Sunday of the Church's year and conclude our Sunday readings from St Matthew's Gospel. Jesus came as the shepherd king, to establish the kingdom of God, a kingdom of love and service of others. This is different from today's society of individualism, the society of the advertisement culture and the consumerist agenda. And of course a culture of entitlement where people say: "I want what I am entitled to, I want as much as I can get; I don't care where it comes from, that's not my responsibility." This is in sharp contrast to a Christ-like concern for others and especially the weakest and the least. Today we are reminded that time will come to an end for each of us and for all, and there will be judgement. Religious observance, prayers, Masses, retreats or novenas, say, help us to live an authentic Christian life, and should produce fruits of compassion. Our judgement will be based on whether we were good, kind, welcoming and giving to other people, whether we had time for those in distress, time for God's little ones. And on whether we were self centred, self absorbed or mean.

The signs of the kingdom of God are acts of compassion to the vulnerable and hurting, love for one another and a realisation that the king identifies himself completely with the least in that kingdom. In our natural self-centred state we are not ready for the kingdom of God, so we are called to repent, a word which means to renew our attitudes. Christ's call for universal compassion can be uncomfortable for those of us who are comfortable.

In the time of Ezekiel those appointed to look after the people of God had failed and God said that he himself would be the shepherd of his people. And Jesus says he is the Good Shepherd, the one who was described by Isaiah, who would rescue, heal, feed and give rest to his sheep, and who would judge them. So we pray that we will have a heart for all who suffer, especially those accounted as unimportant in the eyes of the world, that we will give from our material possessions and give of our time, that we will be loving and generous. And that at the resurrection, by God's mercy, we will be called to life

Funeral Ministry (Further Volunteers Needed)

During the early weeks of 2011 ten members of the Parish Community who had volunteered to become involved in Funeral ministry received training and preparation at diocesan level. This group has worked in two's to provide support and backup for the priests of the parish in helping families pray for their dead. The work of the funeral ministers has added dignity and enhanced funeral service in Ballincollig Parish. We are inviting additional parishioners to volunteer to become involved in this ministry. Those interested might give their names and contact details to one of the priests of the parish, the sacristans, or the parish office as soon as possible. Training and preparation will again be provided by the Diocese.

Pastoral Areas Parish Clusters

For some years the Parishes of Kilmurry, Cloughduv and Canovee; Ovens / Farran; and Ballincollig has been grouped together in a cluster. Bishop Buckley announced on 28th October "having considered the reasons put forward by Ballinora Parish for a reconfiguration, and having carefully considered the needs of both Pastoral areas that would be effected by such a change, I have decided that Ballinora Parish would in all likelihood be best serviced by such a change". This means a revised cluster of four parishes, with eight churches served by six full time priests, plus two priests with other appointments who help out when available at weekends. Bishop Buckley has directed that each priest may only celebrate three masses each weekend. This in effect means a reduction of Masses in the cluster area, at present this looks like a reduction of four. There is a variety of Mass times available each Sunday, in the case of Ballincollig ranging from 8.30 am; 10.00 am; 11.00 am; 12 noon; 12.30 pm and 5.30 pm. Change and reductions are always difficult as well as disappointing; however I am asking for parishioners understanding, forbearance and prayers. Comments and suggestions are welcome as we strive to come to a decision at parish level and cluster level.



Arriving In The Church

Usually when we come into God's house we bow our heads or go down on one knee. This is called 'genuflection'. It shows respect and love for Jesus. We genuflect or bow in front of the tabernacle, the special place where Jesus is present at all times. The tabernacle may be behind the altar or to one side of it. There will be a red light near the tabernacle, called the Sanctuary Lamp. This light tells us that Jesus, the Blessed Sacrament, is present inside. The Blessed Sacrament is another name for Jesus.
