Third Sunday Of Advent

John the Baptist was sent by God to prepare for Christ's coming. His task was to make people attentive to the Spirit who would be fully present in God's anointed.

Third Sunday of Advent - Gaudete Sunday

"As well as this, there were many other things he said to exhort the people and to announce the Good News to them".

Today is known as Gaudete Sunday. The third candle in the Advent Wreath is lit. It is a rose/pink colour. The rose/pink colour signifies the sense of expectancy building to a moment of rejoicing and hope as the long awaited promise of the Messiah is born among us.

Some of the virtues that St Paul spoke of so often in his letters were the gifts of faith, hope and love. The greatest being love.

I suggest that we might ask ourselves where we need the virtue of Hope in our lives. So many times when I write a letter, an e-mail or send a text I automatically wish and hope that the person is well, is good, is able to respond to the message, is understanding that was we link up we are linked together in spirit and word by whatever means of communication we use. The key to any of the virtues is communication.

I once heard of a study of the profound positive effects of the gift of hope to those who are receiving medical treatment.

In the study the doctors deliberately took two different approaches –

one named the items of medicine that were prescribed in their correct medical terminology which started with the letters O. H. E. P. and the other doctor said to the patient literally I am giving you HOPE.

The patient given HOPE improved dramatically compared to the patient given the same medicine by its proper name.

Where do you need to renew your sense of HOPE in yourself, God, others this Advent? Equipped with HOPE we offer ourselves and others something truly life-giving. There will be gifts we wrap and there will be texts/cards/ e-mail sent to loved ones, friends, neighbours. Let's gift something of the Christmas message of HOPE to ourselves and others as we reflect on the Light of the world – the wonder of the Incarnation - the New Message longing to be heard afresh every day alongside Emmanuel, God with us.

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Christmas Confession

Going to confession for Christmas has been part and parcel of Irish Catholic life for generations. Older people will recall long slow-moving queues at the confessional on Christmas Eve. Even today when attitudes have changed Catholics still see a close connection between the Sacrament of Reconciliation and the celebration of the birth of Christ.

The old style Confession was an ordeal for many people: they found the slow queuing unnerving, they were afraid the priest might be deaf and that his questions and comments might be overheard by those waiting inline; they were afraid that if they were kept in longer than usual it might embarrass them. Children also were afraid that they might 'get stuck' in the Act of Contrition.

Perhaps it is because of all these considerations that the Reconciliation Service, the modern form of the Sacrament has taken on so well. In the new communal celebration we prepare ourselves together for confession and give thanks together for the forgiveness received. There are readings, a homily, an examination of conscience conducted in common, a shared request for forgiveness and a thanksgiving in common. Central to the ceremony is the opportunity given to each person to come up to the priest of their choice and make a brief confession of their sins. At the Penitential Ceremony there may be some people who for one reason or another do not wish to make a confession. These may ask the priest for a blessing and no one will know whether or not they have made a confession.

The confession of sins, in a sense, frees us from the power sin had over our lives. By telling his sins to the priest, man looks squarely at the sins he is guilty of, takes responsibility for them, and thereby opens himself again to God and to the communion of the Church in order to make a new future possible. Being open to the communion of the Church refers, not to Holy Communion or the Blessed Eucharist but rather to our sense of belonging to the parish community. Sin damages or even breaks brotherly friendship in the family, in the neighbourhood or in the wider community in which we live. To steal, to aggress others, to hate, to insult, to drive drunkenly - all such actions offend God but they also offend against other people. Sin is an act of aggression against our fellow man as well as against God. The Sacrament of Penance repairs and restores our union with our fellow man. Because the Penitential Service is shared publicly with our neighbours it expresses our desire to admit our sin and our desire to 'make up' with our families, our neighbours and all of God's children throughout the world.


