Loss and Bereavement - Part 2 of 4

Last Saturday afternoon as we had to move the scheduled Mass in St Oliver's Cemetery to St Mary's & St John's Church due to the inclement weather. In our gathering we saw in a practical way that death is not an isolated part of life, is not an isolated part of the community. It is a common human and Christian experience. For one thing the special gathering indicated that bereavement and death is something shared with others and with our fellow Christian brothers and sisters.

As November is the month when we, as Christians, remember in a particular way our departed relatives and friends, I offer thoughts of a Christian and human nature upon the mysteries of death, bereavement and the path to finding Christian hope, and light.

Because of the personal losses of Dad and my sister unlike any past reflections I've had on these things I now face them very differently indeed. These are only guidelines and the stages can interchange with each other. Some of the thoughts are my own and some are a mixture of reflections on the things I've seen and experienced with the help of the writings of others who journeyed through their grief.

The Process of Grief.

A) Denial. B) Anger. C) Bargaining. D) Depression. E) Acceptance.

As a member of a big family up to the mid 90's death hadn't really touched our doorstep as it had others. The parents alive and well and no sickness or accident of any serious nature to cause the family or myself too much concern or anxiety. That all changed in February 96 and was felt again in December 96 with the deaths of my Dad and my sister. Each of us reacted differently. There were reactions of shock, disbelief, feelings that this couldn't be true.

I felt something telling me to stay focused on difficult realities and the precious moments of life and the final words of departing.

"Try not to deny anything that was happening or may happen" was my motto.

To deny a difficult truth, to deny the possibility of death for a loved one or yourself is a coping mechanism. It is sometimes a person's way of adjusting to the unexpected, the shattering feelings of helplessness.

Elizabeth Kubler-Ross in On Death and Dying explains it this way. "Denial functions as a buffer after unexpected shocking news, allows one to collect oneself and, with time, mobilize other less radical defenses."

Denial protects us from the full impact of a loss, allows us to absorb it a little at a time, only as much as we can bear.

In our society, denial serves a practical function, too.

The responsibility for all the business details of a death falls on the shoulders of the bereaved. Should there be an autopsy?

A funeral? Who will see to the arrangements? Who will pay the bills?

Usually the person who is most vulnerable and wounded by death is responsible for those decisions. He/she can't "fall apart."

Who would take care of things if he/she did?

We praise bereaved people for "holding up," for "keeping up appearances." "You're doing so well," we tell them. And while the numbness lasts, they may think so, too. But this stage passes. The truth sinks in. We, and the people around us, may be unprepared for the intensity of the feelings that come flooding in.

"Anger, rage, envy and resentment - displaced in all directions and projected onto the environment at times almost at random," writes Kubler-Ross.

While I didn't consciously get into denial at what one might call the thinking or head level the reality definitely came home to me a couple of days after the funeral. It was when it was "all over."

Thanks be to God for those who were so good to me as they spent hours with me during that particular "night" - More next week.

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THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: 2 Maccabees 7:1-2, 9-14

The Maccabees were Jewish young men who died for their faith. They knew there would be a resurrection, and they were not afraid to die.

Second Reading: 2 Thessalonians 2:16 - 3:5

In the second reading, we remember that Christ's return is near. God will give strength, and so for us the future holds no fear.

Gospel: Luke 20:27-38

At the time Jesus lived, not everyone believed in resurrection. The Sadducees especially resisted the idea and tried to make Jesus look foolish when they asked who would be the man's wife in heaven. They posed a situation where a woman's husband died. As was the custom of the time, the brother of a deceased man married the widow in order to insure heirs. They predicted that hypothetically if enough husbands died, she could meet seven husbands at her own resurrection. Which one would be her husband in heaven, they wondered? Neither we nor the Sadducees can fully understand life after death, but Jesus asks us to trust that something much greater than our understanding awaits us at the resurrection


