The Sermon on the Mount

"Jesus said to his disciples: 'Do not imagine that I have come to abolish the Law of the Prophets but to complete them."

Over the years I have proclaimed God's word, joined in, celebrated, concelebrated Mass and the sacraments in many different types of settings. In a Parish Church; in Diocesan Cathedrals; in places of pilgrimage like Lourdes and Knock; on the island of Whiddy; on an island off Malta has marks the place where St Paul was shipwrecked on his way for trial in Rome. Such settings were indoor and outdoor with large numbers and sometimes with a handful of people and always remembering the piece of scripture that says: "Where two or three are gathered in my name there am I in their midst."

The earliest known words recorded of Christ are those when He set foot in the Temple, and opened the scriptures as He regularly did, and proclaimed from Isaiah, "The Spirit of the Lord has been given to me, He has sent me to proclaim the Good News; to proclaim a year of the Lord's favour." He spoke with authority, unlike the Scribes and Pharisees, and said that those very words were being fulfilled in Himself. So the first words of He spoke were words of confirmation identifying Himself as one sent and this was amid a setting of a Temple, a place of worship, reflection, institution.

Today in the Gospel the setting as recording my St Matthew is on a mountainside with large crowds, the multitude. His words are taken from what is known as The Sermon on the Mount. Because we celebrated the Feast of the Presentation on February 2nd we missed hearing about that setting and yet the setting is paramount to understanding the proclaiming of the Word made Flesh beyond place (Temple), time (year of favour). We moved into the Sermon last weekend when He told His listeners, disciples, multitude, "You are the salt of the earth and the light of the world."

Jesus the Teacher and Master proclaims a word for us about another type of Temple, the temple of our spirits, hearts, lives. He speaks now to a multitude as One who is fulfilling the Law and other Traditions of the Jewish people and yet is adamant that the Laws have their weaknesses in that they can be followed only at times at an external level.

I am recalling how St Paul challenged St Peter that faith in Christ was what redeems, and not the keeping of Laws. We might mind the externals in case we fall into the mode of keeping the message at bay and thus not allowing ourselves be touched at depth level.

THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: Sirach 15:15-20

The problem of God's knowledge and human freedom has puzzled philosophers for centuries. If God sees all" even the future, then everything is determined in advance and there seems little room for human freedom. The author of this text doesn't recognise the problem but simply assures us that God absolutely respects our freedom. He is a concerned Father rather than a meddling 'Big Brother'.

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 2:6-10

In general philosophers have no time for mysteries. They only see problems that are open in principle to solution by rational means. For Paul, such thinkers are immature, like children or adolescents who think they have all the answers though their experience is limited. The wisdom of faith carries us beyond the senses, beyond the limits of our own minds, into the mind of God who reveals himself in Christ.

Gospel Reading: Matthew 5:17-37

Actions and their consequences are to morality what symptoms are to health. An unhealthy person often shows symptoms of disease -pain, loss of energy, poor colour. But the doctor shouldn't focus on these alone. Sometimes the patient is ill yet shows no external signs. And when telltale signs are there, the doctor mustn't treat the symptoms alone, forgetting the underlying condition. Jesus is a wise moral physician, insisting that right and wrong actions stem from a good or bad heart. Sin is like an iceberg, where the bulk lies under the surface. The healing of negative attitudes -anger, lust, infidelity is hard work demanding serious sacrifices. There can be no quick fix or superficial solutions here.

Ethnic Cleansing in the Lee Valley

Muskerry Local History Society are organising an illustrated lecture on "Ethnic Cleansing in the Lee Valley - Medieval-style" by Dr. Paul McCotter, UCC., on Tuesday, 18 February, at 8.00 pm in Ballincollig

Rugby Club. Research carried out by Dr McCotter shows how the Normans cleared out Gaelic clans from the Lee Valley but in turn the Gaelic clans rose up against Norman settlers with such ferocity that they butchered many of them and sent the rest seeking the safety of Cork City. Dr McCotter states that many hundreds, if not thousands, of Norman settlers were murdered as part of the ethnic cleansing of the Lee Valley, a sizeable proportion of the settler population at the time. Some were so frightened that they fled back to England.
