Saints Peter and Paul

Peter and Paul were dominant characters in the infant church after the resurrection and ascension of Christ. Both came to know Christ in different ways. The gospel of John 1: 40 relates that "early next morning, Andrew met his brother and said to him, we have found the Messiah – which means Christ – and he took Simon to Jesus. (Who is Andrew in my life) Jesus looked hard at him and said, you are Simon son of John; you are to be called Cephas. "

Jesus gave great attention to Peter and went on to appoint him leader of the twelve " thou art Peter, on this rock I will build my church" Today's gospel John 21: 15 Jesus poses the question " Simon Peter do you love me more than these others do "? Yes Lord "You know I love you" .Jesus said to him" Feed my Lambs". Later in the dialogue Jesus added "follow me". This passage reveals the affection and trust Jesus has for Peter. Jesus also points to shepherding as the primary task of church leaders.

Paul on the other hand is a Pharisee who in his early years attacked the early converts at every opportunity. Paul's conversion is very dramatic and from then on he became a totally committed believer. Paul suffered for his beliefs but continued to preach the good news. Paul's letters give us an insight into his character and faith. Paul continually gives thanks, indeed to think for Paul is to give thanks. Cor 8; 9 "You know the generosity of our Lord, though rich He became poor, so that you may become rich"

St. Oliver Plunkett 01-July-2014

St. Oliver Plunkett came from Irish nobility whose family supported King Charles I. Ordained in Rome in 1654 he became a Professor of theology from 1654 through 1669. He was appointed Archbishop of Armagh in 1669. He was forced to conduct a covert ministry during the suppression of priests. He was arrested and tried at Dundalk in 1679 for conspiring against the state. It was seen that Oliver would never be convicted in Ireland, and he was moved to Newgate prison, London. St. Oliver Plunkett was found guilty of high treason "for promoting the Catholic faith," and was condemned to a gruesome death. He was martyred 1 July 1681 at Tyburn by hanging, disembowelling, quartering and beheading. He was the last Catholic to die for his faith at Tyburn, and the first of the Irish martyrs to be beatified. His body was initially buried in two tin boxes next to five Jesuits who had died before; his head is in Saint Peter's Church at Drogheda, Ireland; most of his body is at Downside Abbey, England; some relics in Ireland.

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THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading - Acts 12: 1-11

The first part of today's first reading reminds us that right from its early days the Church did not have a smooth sailing, things were difficult and the church suffered persecution. King Herod had James the brother of John beheaded and then arrested Peter and put him in prison. We sometimes tend to believe that since we are doing God's work, God should make things easy for us and yet in the history of the Church we see that discipleship necessarily implies the cross. If we are not ready to accept the crosses along the way of life we cannot really follow in his footsteps.

Second Reading - 2 Timothy 4: 6-8, 17-18

In the second reading from the letter of Paul to Timothy, Paul describes his vision of what it means to follow Jesus in life and in death. He is clear in his vision and thinking and knows that following Jesus demands that his life has to be lived not for himself but for others. As he nears his end he knows what is coming and is prepared not because of his own power and strength but because he believes in the mercy and power of the Lord Jesus Christ. "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race. I have kept the faith. From now on there is reserved for me the crown of glory...not only for me but for all who longed for his coming." Paul was very much aware of his own frailty, while at the same time fully aware of the presence of the Lord in his life. "The Lord stood by me and gave me strength. To him be glory for ever..."

Gospel Reading - Matthew 16: 13-19

Today's gospel centre's on Peter's confession of faith. Peter had been chosen to lead the apostles so it was fitting that he should be the first to proclaim his faith in the Lord. What was important to Peter was not his failings and weaknesses but rather his faith in the Lord Jesus. Faith was not his acquisition but rather a gift given to him and hence he could openly confess and proclaim the Lord Jesus. When Jesus asked: "Who do you say that I am?" He did not hesitate to answer on behalf of others, "You are the Christ, the son of the living God." Upon Peter's confession Jesus made it quite clear that 'flesh and blood has not revealed this to you but my Father in heaven.' After accepting Peter's profession of faith, Jesus affirms Peter and gives him his mission: "You are Peter and on this rock I will build my Church and the gates of hell will not prevail against it. I give you the keys of the kingdom..."

Like Peter each and every one of us has to answer that question: "Who do you say that I am?" Who is Jesus to you and me? Our answer cannot be what we have read or heard about Jesus, what others have told us about him, but what we have discovered in the depth of our heart.

Cancer Risks, Did you know?

- ◆ Ireland has among the highest skin cancer rates in Europe.
- ◆ Two-thirds of Irish people have a higher risk of developing Skin Cancer because of their skin type.
- ◆ 90% of all skin cancers are preventable
- ◆ Damage to the skin by the sun is permanent. In later life this can lead to skin cancer.
- ◆ For the majority of the population, 10-15 minutes daily exposure of the face and hands to the sun and adequate diet provides a sufficient level of vitamin D.
- ◆ Skin damage is caused by exposure to ultraviolet rays, which are strongest from 11 am to 3 pm.
- ◆ The number of skin cancer cases is rising every year.

Common Sense about Prayer

In a big or a small way, most of us have had the experience of not being properly dressed for an occasion. You know the kind of situation. You haven't had your hair done for ages, and you have an appointment with the hairdresser for tomorrow. But today the doorbell rings. You take off the soiled apron and throw it on a chair and you answer the bell. There standing at the door is a cousin you haven't seen for years. And she is done up to the nines! You feel like something the cat carried in after dark. You invite her in, trying to hide the apron before she sees it, and you long for just a minute or two to straighten yourself out. Meantime you can hardly take in a word she is saying. Of course it could be worse. You could turn up to a classy party in an off-the-peg little number, and discover too late that everyone else is wearing the latest in designer elegance. It is a moment for the ground to open and swallow you up. It is a question of being dressed up properly for an occasion and of feeling like a misfit or a fool if we are not. We sense that the only way to respond to quality is with quality, To elegance is with elegance. And to holiness is with...

Coming before God to celebrate the Eucharist we are likewise conscious of 'the state I am in'. In his holy company we have an overwhelming sense of our own sinfulness. We want a moment to put on a bit of spiritual make-up, to tidy ourselves up spiritually. This is what we do at the beginning of Mass when we acknowledge our sins and beg the Lord for his mercy. We are trying to get ourselves presentable, trying to lessen the dreadful confusion and embarrassment of being sinners in God's awesome presence.
