"God calls us" - Week of Prayer for Christian Unity

'God's Call' is the theme running through today's readings. All of us have a specific call from the Lord to follow and serve him in a particular way - each with our unique gifts. In the first Reading God repeatedly calls Samuel. Initially he doesn't recognize God's call. When he does he responds 'speak Lord your servant is listening'. In the different events of our daily life God continues to call us. He especially calls us to a relationship with him by giving time to him in prayer. We may not always recognize his voice, but sometimes he may be speaking to us through others or through a situation in our lives.

In the Gospel we hear John the Baptist pointing out Jesus to two of his disciples: "Look! There is the Lamb of God!" Hearing this the two disciples follow Jesus who asks them: "What do you want?" They respond: 'teacher where do you live?' He invites them to 'come and see'; they both accept the invitation and stay with Jesus. We see the faith and trust of these early disciples. When we discover something very valuable or meet someone who has touched our lives, it's natural to want to share it with others. Andrew, one of the disciples, immediately went to his brother Simon Peter to share the news of his encounter with the Lord and brought him to meet Jesus. We all evangelize when we bring others to Jesus!

'Give me to Drink' is the Theme for this week of 'Prayer for Christian Unity'- prepared by a group from the National Council of Christian Churches of Brazil.'The encounter between Jesus and the Samaritan woman (John 4) invites us to try water from a different well and also to offer a little of our own. When Jesus says to her, "please give me a drink" it implies an ethical action of the need for one another in living out the Church's mission; to seek unity in the midst of our diversity, through our openness to a variety of forms of prayer and Christian spirituality; and to recognize that persons, communities, cultures, religions and ethnicities need each other'. The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is a privileged moment for prayer, encounter and dialogue. It is an opportunity to recognize the richness and value that are present in the other, the different, and to ask God for the gift of unity'. *Sr. Colette*

Reflection for Parents

Try to imagine the excitement these first disciples felt when they heard Jesus' words. There must have been something very compelling in what Jesus said and the hope he gave these men in order for them to drop everything and not only follow him, but to go to others with the exciting news. That's how our enthusiasm should reach our children. It would be good to check our own level of enthusiasm for Jesus' call to us so that whenever our children hear our words and stories about Jesus, they will immediately recognize our passion.

Massacre in West Cork

A large crowd is expected for the lecture organised by Muskerry Local History Society on 'Massacre in West Cork' by Barry Keane. Barry is the author of a very well received book of the same name where he reconsiders the numerous questions that still surround the Ballygroman (Ovens) and Dunmanway killings in April, 1922. Beginning with the death of IRA Commandant, Michael O'Neill, followed by the killings of Herbert Woods and Thomas and Samuel Hornibrook, further west in what became known as the Dunmanway Massacre, over four nights, 10 local Protestants were shot in their homes by unknown men. The lecture will be held at 8.00pm on Monday, 19 January in Ballincollig Rugby Club.

THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: 1 Samuel 3: 3-10,19

Like John the Baptist, Samuel was born when his mother thought she would never have a child. She dedicated him to the service of God in the Temple where he received his special calling from God. This extract recounts the moment of that calling and states that the Lord remained with him in a special way all his life.

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians, 6: 13-15, 17-20

St. Paul explains the foundations of Christian chastity. The human body made for God must not be debased for present pleasure. The body is eternal and should be respected. The popular modern sentiment: "my body is my own" is contradicted by Paul who says: "You are not your own property; you have been bought and paid for." Jesus bought and paid for us with his own blood shed on Calvary.

Gospel: John 1: 35-42

This is the moment when the Church began to find its Saviour. The solemnity and grace of the simple narrative are equal to the occasion: John the Baptist standing, two disciples nearby. The disciples follow Jesus. The heavenly attraction had begun to exercise its power. Jesus turned and gazed on the two men following him and spoke the first words from the lips of the Saviour reported by St. John: a "What do you want?". That same question is asked of all of us who follow Jesus: "Why do we follow him? What is it that we seek?
