Today we celebrate him who speaks with AUTHORITY and to whom we must give our undivided attention. Some of the political parties, we are told, both in Ireland and across the pond are setting themselves on Election Mode. The political structures and machines are being set in motion with manifestos; the seeking and choosing of candidates; raising funding and finances; dealing with media as they build into a mode of frenzy. We then as citizens ponder and reflect on who we might give our mandate to as regards running the affairs of the State nationally and locally.

In the Church itself there is a period of transition as our own Diocese and others await decisions regarding leadership.

It is always our hope that any leader is and will be somebody that people can identify with and who understands the realities of its citizens or flock. A leader with the ability to speak for those who need a voice. A leader humble enough to have honesty as an integral part of their work and ministry so that their words and actions match. Is all of that possible? Up to now I didn't use the word AUTHORITY as sometimes the word will have a very negative connotation. We tend to think of authority mostly in terms of imposing a position, a charge, a penalty, a law etc.

Now let us look at the concept of authority that is used to describe Jesus. The word authority is used in a positive and complimentary way. It is because His Words and Truths were uplifting, life-giving, life enhancing, offering direction, and offering potential, possibility. His altogether new type of Leadership was coming from one willing to be humble to serve to lead in a different way than before. His words and deeds were spoken with authority. As a leader he ate with sinners - touched the hands of lepers - prayed to His father - sat at the least important seat - allowed Himself to be called all sorts of names such as Son of the Devil instead Son of God - allowed Himself to form a gathering of people who would let Him down and betray Him. His leadership has authority because we understand all of His words and actions are coming from a place of love, God's love, Divine Love, and a human love enveloped by God's love.

Even in the leadership that Jesus offers He allows us to freely believe, freely listen, freely respond, and freely choose. No coercion just love.

Much of Jesus' teaching took place in a synagogue and specifically in today's reading, the synagogue at Capernaum was filled with Jewish people from Galilee. Jesus' listeners were surprised by his knowledge and authority. He especially surprised them when he cast out an evil spirit from one of the men. The evil spirit recognized who Jesus was and called him "the Holy One of God." The people didn't understand this meaning. Only the evil spirit recognised Jesus. The people, however, were impressed by Jesus' deeds and brought others to him for healing.


