Second Sunday of Lent

To be asked to offer up your only Son was a terrible sacrifice. In the end Abraham was not asked to make it, but God Himself has offered it for us. It is from this sacramental gift that all our blessings come.

Trust in God

This weekend the Word of God in passages from the book of Genesis and the gospel of Mark not only frightened Peter but really puts Abraham's trust in God to the test. Christ and Abraham are really committed to doing God's will. Abraham is faced with the most awful moment of his life, being asked to go to Moriah and kill his son. The angel of God spoke to Abraham "do not raise your hand against this boy". This account makes it clear that God forbids taking human life, inflicting pain or hurt on humans. This message from God leaves us in no doubt that we cannot hurt, harm or inflict pain on others in God's name or the name of religion.

The Genesis account also highlights the depth of faith and trust in God demonstrated by Abraham. May each of us be blessed with a similar faith?

The account of the Transfiguration in Mark's gospel at face value seems to be a pleasant occasion. Like all events there is a subtext. Christ at this stage of his public life was facing a real dilemma. Did the Father truly expect Him to go to Jerusalem, Did the Father really expect the ultimate sacrifice from Him. The mountain was a favourite place of prayer and reflection for Christ. This occasion on Mt Tabor there is reassurance by the presence of Moses and Elijah, no wonder even the brave Peter was frightened. Then from the cloud came the voice "this is my son, the beloved. Listen to Him."

Both readings give a very strong message that God is close to each of us. He is with us when the day is bright and dazzling. God is with us when we are frightened. God is with us when we are faced with impossible situations and furthermore God's presence makes a difference. May we have some of the faith and trust of Abraham.

THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: Genesis 22: 1-2, 9-13, 15-18

By his command to sacrifice Isaac God proclaimed his absolute dominion over the lives of men who are the work of his hands. By the revocation of the order he manifested that he did not wish this dominion to be acknowledged by the actual sacrifice of human life. The double lesson was necessary as the neighbouring Canaanites offered such sacrifices to their gods.

Second Reading: Romans 8: 31-34

St. Paul summarises the blessings of the spiritual life in the assurance of God's love for us in Christ. All our personal difficulties become insignificant as soon as our eyes turn away from them to contemplate that one great act of love of God in which he did not spare his own Son for our salvation. It is true that there will be an examination after death, which we all fear. Redeemed and defended by Christ we need fear no condemnation from his lips.

Gospel: Mark 9: 2-10

The Transfiguration of Christ, together with the appearance of Moses and Elias and the declaration by the Father, was a confirmation of all that Christ had taught them concerning his own Person and his relation to the Old Law. It was intended to strengthen the faith of the Apostles and to prepare them for the trials of the Passion. According to Leo the Great the chief purpose of the Transfiguration was to remove the scandal of the Cross from the hearts of the disciples.

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Women's World Day of Prayer - March 6th

Is a global, ecumenical movement of Christian women joined together to observe a common day of prayer each year on the first Friday of March. What started as separate days of prayer organised by individual denominations in America has become a truly international and ecumenical world day of prayer. Today around 170 countries take part. The service is translated into more than 60 languages and 1000 dialects.

Through the World Day of Prayer, women are encouraged to become aware of the other countries and cultures and no longer live in isolation. The World Day of Prayer aims to demonstrate that prayer and action are inseparable and that both have immeasurable influence in the world.

Every year, the Prayer Service focuses on a different country and a specific theme. The Prayer Service for World Day of Prayer 2015 has been prepared by Christian women of the Bahamas. The theme "Jesus said to them 'Do You Know What I Have Done to You?'" is based on the Gospel of John 13:1-17. After washing the feet of his community of disciples, a gesture described in detail in the Gospel, Jesus asked this question, "Do you know what I have done to you?" How would you respond to that? Jesus is God's presence of radical love in the world. Following Jesus' example of washing his disciple's feet, we are asked to continue the gesture of love in The Bahamas and in our own communities around the world. That is how the spiral of informed prayer and prayerful action moves around the globe.

THROUGH WOMEN'S WORLD DAY OF PRAYER,

Women are encouraged

- to be enriched by the faith experience of other Christians
- to become aware of the situation of women in other countries
- to share their hopes fears, joys, sorrows, opportunities and needs and to pray with and for them
- to turn their prayers into positive action

We rejoice in the lives of dedicated women throughout the world who have enabled the original vision to grow and blossom. We thank God that we have the privilege of sharing in this precious gift of Women's World Day of Prayer and we pray that it will continue to bind women together throughout the world in the love of Christ.

LOGO

This very unique logo was designed in Ireland in 1982, the year in which Irish women from both Northern Ireland and the Republic prepared the service. It was later adopted as the Movement's International logo. Some of those symbols are the circle and the Celtic cross, arrows from north, south, east, and west converging as if toward the centre of a compass, and persons kneeling in prayer, all superimposed on a globe. These symbols simultaneously indicate unity and diversity. All are joined together within the circle of the world and enfolded in God's love
