Third Sunday of Lent

Jesus came on earth as the complete embodiment of God's presence among men. We are all called to become one with him in the image of God by keeping his commandments.

Decalogue / Ten Commandments

"Jesus went up to Jerusalem" before the Jewish Passover. The Passover celebrates one of the high point in the relationship of God with the chosen people. The giving of the Decalogue is another such high point remembered, however these high points became more of a burden for the people as the Decalogue becomes associated with rules and regulations whereas they are intended for a people with a deep relationship with God being guided and supported in their daily living.

The road to Jerusalem is seen by Jesus as the final stretch of journey marking his failure as Messiah. The visit to the temple with the house of prayer turned in to a market place depicts the failure of the Old Covenant. The chosen people managed to exclude all others from the temple except their own, the chosen ones and in the process not only excluded the gentiles but placed so many burdens on themselves that their relationship with God was fractured and in tatters, He drove out the buyers, the sellers, scattered their tables and money and annoyed the Jews so much they asked for a sign "what sign will you give us". Christ sure gave a sign "destroy this temple and in three days, I will raise it up." The Jews got it wrong again; they were thinking of blocks and mortar not the human body of Christ.

Lord help us to trust that you accompany us on our journey to the Jerusalem's in our lives. May your travels there give us strength and hope.

Reflection

The New Testament speaks of God's raising Jesus from the dead and of Jesus' rising from the dead. In today's gospel it is the latter phrase that is used by John. The technique of having hearers misunderstand a saying of Jesus is one familiar to the fourth gospel. The correct understanding always follows as here. The result of the signs which Jesus worked, and his rising from the dead, was the greatest of these, namely, belief. The effectiveness of all the signs portrayed is measured by whether or not they bring about the belief of the hearers or onlookers.

THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: Exodus 20: 1-3, 7-8, 12-17
 The Ten Commandments expound briefly and clearly the fundamental principles of all religious and moral obligation. The first three prescribe man's duty to God, the last seven his duty to his neighbour. In the second list the fourth commandment comes first because the family comes before the state and parents have the first and strongest claim to their children's regard. The Decalogue is in no way nationalistic but universal in its outlook. What it commands is necessary if people are to live in community in a civilized manner.

Second Reading: 1Cor. 1: 22-25

The Jews wanted chiefly superhuman power in the Messiah, power proved by stupendous miracles. They wanted an emperor mightier than the Roman emperor. A suffering and dying Messiah was a stumbling block to them, i.e. they would not accept him. But the Greeks wanted a teaching, which completely satisfied the intellect. They were impatient of anything unexplained or mysterious. They hated to accept any great truth on anyone else's authority. Faith was not in their line. The idea that suffering could do more than wisdom would appear nonsense to them.

Gospel: John 2: 13-25

This is one of the most dramatic actions of Jesus in his public life. With it he declared his opposition to the Jewish interests vested in making money out of the faith of believers. Jesus then takes the imagination of the onlookers a step further by making mention of his resurrection from the dead. This prophecy must have stuck in their minds because they turned it to sarcasm on Calvary.

Jesus is 'overcome' with fierce love and passion because of the injustice he sees before him. What temples have we turned into market places today? Our world is driven by consumerism and profit at the expense of our environment and at the expense of the resources of the world's poorest people. The Book of Creation is now speaking to us to stop making this house a market place. We don't have to look too far to see how climate change is having adverse effects on our weather systems here across the Island of Ireland and in the poorest regions of the world. Let us pray this Sunday that 'zeal for your house will consume' us and that we will take the necessary steps to ensure a more sustainable world for all. World leaders are working towards a global treaty on climate change but they are not agreed on how to cut emissions to sufficient levels in order to reduce global temperatures.
