We see him today as the Saviour, who cares for our immediate as well as our ultimate needs.

"Lord That I May See"

In today's Gospel we hear the story of Jesus leaving Jericho with his disciples; and of Bartimaeus, a blind beggar man, sitting at the side of the road, who hears that Jesus is passing by and who calls out, "Jesus, son of David have pity on me." Some of Jesus' followers try to silence him, but he shouts all the more believing that he would be healed. Having heard his plea, Jesus tells the people to bring Bartimaeus to Him and then asks him: 'What do you want me to do for you?' He replies: "Master, let me see again". His prayer is an act of Faith in Jesus who responds saying: "Go, your faith has saved you". God not only healed his physical blindness but Bartimaeus recognizes what is more important in life and responds by becoming a follower of Jesus.

Maybe we can see a bit of ourselves in today's story! We may think 'I am not blind', but there are different kinds of 'blindness'. We may be 'blind' to seeing the needs of those around us; we may close our eyes to seeing the goodness in other people....So often we, may find ourselves in a 'dark place'; looking for someone to simply remove or lighten the burdens we face in life. Like Bartimaeus we may be waiting "by the roadside" for the right person or circumstances to come along to give us encouragement and a sense of hope.

Our first call out of 'darkness' is at our Baptism when we begin our own Journey of Faith.

Like Bartimaeus we become followers of Jesus. As members of a Christian community, Jesus calls us to imitate him in helping those in need on the way. No one is excluded. But sometimes we may not recognize Him in others. If Jesus asked us today "what do you want me to do for you?" What would be my response?......

We pray: "Lord, let me see again." We thank you for the gift of faith and sight. Help us to see what is important in our lives and to be faithful to You. Help us to see and respond to the needs of others. We remember the many suffering in our world today that feel helpless and live in darkness for one reason or another.

Letter from Fr. Irbahim to Ballincollig Parishoners

I am thankful to you, for what you are trying to do for all of us: to be the "good Samaritan" (Jesus), for the suffering brethren in Aleppo.

So you can understand our daily situation, I'll try to explain to you what is happening here in these days. I shall start from the basic needs of the people and families-- needs that for a long time have not found an adequate response.

Let me tell you what happened in the last three days. A bomb fell right behind our Church of St. Francis, in the district of Azizieh, in a densely populated area, crowded with people resting or walking quietly through the streets in the afternoon.

The next day I went out to visit the houses damaged by the explosion and saw an immensity of ruins and debris. We have to thank the Lord because the damage was mainly limited to houses and only a few people were injured slightly. I perceived a lot of pain and sadness in people's hearts, so much fear and desperation. I prayed with them in their damaged houses, blessing everyone and everything with holy water.

As soon as I went back to the convent, I started providing help for the reconstruction of the houses, all support was immediately delivered to the families in need.

Without a moment's respite, I came to know of other atrocious bombings in various parts of Aleppo from families coming to the monastery, desperate and begging for our help. A father confessed to me that he had already repaired his house that had been damaged by bombs twice. But this third time he could not take it anymore, He could not even think to start over with a new repair. So he ran with all his family, wife and children, finding refuge at his in-laws, even though their home is very small.


