The Promised Land

In our readings today God calls us to conversion and to repentance, both important aspects of our Lenten journey. In the first reading we hear of God's great care for his people. Having heard their cries and the suffering they were enduring, He chooses Moses to be a voice for them and to deliver them out of the hands of the Egyptians. He promises He will journey with them and Moses as they seek the 'Promised Land'. On that journey He will remain faithful, providing for them, even in spite of their sinfulness.

In the Gospel we hear the parable of the Barren Fig Tree, which hasn't produced fruit for three years, so the owner wants it cut down; but the 'Gardener' intercedes asking for a little longer time to nurture it before it meets its fate. If properly nurtured the barren tree may yet bear fruit. This parable describes God's Mercy and patience towards us. During Lent we are called to repent and to change. Perhaps, we can be like that tree by not producing the fruit of love and compassion God asks of us; by not living as we should, for God and for others. We often make wrong choices and mistakes, yet God always loves us and is ready to give us another chance. As we hear in today's Psalm: The Lord is compassion and love, slow to anger and reach in Mercy.

In Pope Francis' Lenten message, he says: "God's mercy transforms human hearts; it enables us, through the experience of a faithful love, to become merciful in turn. In an ever new miracle, divine mercy shines forth in our lives, inspiring each of us to love our neighbour and to devote ourselves to what the Church's tradition calls the spiritual and corporal works of mercy. These works remind us that faith finds expression in concrete everyday actions meant to help our neighbours in body and spirit: by feeding, visiting, comforting and instructing them. On such things will we be judged. For this reason, I express my hope that 'the Christian people may reflect on the corporal and spiritual works of mercy; this will be a way to reawaken our conscience, too often grown dull in the face of poverty, and to enter more deeply into the heart of the Gospel where the poor have a special experience of God's mercy'

Parish Update from Aleppo Two Missiles on Ram

Dear friends,

I will try to tell you what is happening here in Aleppo, since the army's offensive to take back the city has begun. On the night between February 3rd and 4th, two missiles fired by the Jihadists shot the area of Soulaymanieh-Ram, where our pastoral center is located. Before I had heard the dreadful news, I had planned to gather all the friars in a local pastoral chapter in order to figure out how we could intensify our mission in the area of Soulaymanieh and of Midaan. The result of constant bombing is always the same: death and destruction. Two Christians have died; there are many injured people and a lot of damaged houses.

We are discouraged because we had just finished to repair the damage caused by the missiles shot on April 12th 2015, when these new bombs arrived, destroying again what we had just fixed. Our church hasn't been damaged so far, but the roof and the catechism classrooms have been hit and partially destroyed; shocks and explosions have ruined the walls and windows, which have been crushed down. The first missile that fell on our pastoral center pierced the roof, hitting the statue of the Virgin Mary, the bell tower and some water storage that have been recently installed. The statue of the Virgin Mary broke in thousand pieces and you can imagine our pain to see her face shattered throughout the street.

Scenes of Utter Destruction

The other missile has fallen on the other street, damaging the center entry and killing two Christians, without sparing the buildings, which had been hit by many bombs and missiles in the past. We, Friars, have immediately visited the houses in the area where the two men have died and we have listened to the painful experience of mothers and fathers who have told us the events and how they have experienced, with their children, the fear and the shock. We are trying to stay close to our people who knock on our door seeking for help. Our center, indeed, hosts the families who live in the area, but also people from Midaan (who have sought help after the destruction of the church of Bicharat in Midaan). We are hosting also the Maronite Christian Community who often celebrates Holy Mass during the week, after the destruction of their churches nearby. It is a place where different parish groups meet for their weekly meetings and where there is also a school for deaf and mute people: it is one of the very few specialized centers still functioning in Aleppo. Besides from welcoming them and serving their human and spiritual needs, we distribute water from the well we have in the center.

The Christian district of Midaan

Jihadists continued to fire missiles also on the night between February 4th and 5th, as a counter-offensive to the advance of the governmental forces and their allies. We have been hit again to the core. The explosions have affected the Midaan district where the majority of the people are Christians. It has been a total destruction: the poor remaining inhabitants are now homeless. Try to imagine what it means for the families staying here, while, during the night, missiles fall, without knowing what will happen next.

An old woman cried, while she was telling that people, during that night, didn't know how to behave, what decision to take: "Is it better to run away from home and risk meeting 'sister death' on the road or to stay at home, waiting to be killed by the missiles?" Some families have decided to sleep in the cold, at the entry of their houses, others under the staircases. Once, a woman knocked on our door seeking help with her baby in her arms: she told me that there were still people under the rubble. She had been crying out for help, hoping that someone would have come to help those poor people, but no one had had the courage to answer to her call. The injured people remained there, as well as the corpses, for hours.

Why we remain

But we do not surrender. We are suffering but we are not defeated. We have immediately brought alimentary boxes to the damaged houses while visiting them with the engineers to fix them starting from the doors and the windows. For those who had their entire house damaged, we helped with money to pay the rent of other houses for three months, with the possibility to renew the payment. Lots and lots of scared people knock at our door, especially families with little children. The majority of them cannot even think to escape; they don't have any money, not even for transportation. In this situation there's nothing left for me to do except from welcoming and listening to them. After that we have to start doing something, we can't postpone it to tomorrow. But the work is huge and so are the necessities.

Water and prohibitive prices

There is still the big problem of water. While rockets were flying it was shocking to see people wandering looking for water. People are desperate and they face rockets and rain in order to collect some water from the faucets installed on the roads, above the wells. The cost is now 410 dollars per litter, while yesterday it costed 400. This means that the price of food rises from one day to another, even of the cheaper things like vegetables. A lady told me that even monthly wages, for her who still is fortunate to still have a job, are not enough even for one portion of vegetables a day.

"How long, oh Lord, will you forget me?" (I.e. Psalm 12)

In the sorrow of these days it occurred to my mind the psalm that says "How long, oh Lord, will you forget me?" Sometimes this question comes to me: "Has the Lord left us? Where is the Lord?" This is a moment in which our faith is highly shaken, for all of us, little herd that is left in Aleppo. Christ asked to Saul: "Why do you persecute me?" leaving a firm proof of His union with every part of His Holy Body. He is here, suffering, on the cross and he does not "look away while His people are suffering". He is here in the middle of his people; He helps them and He assists them through the tender clemency and mercy of His pastors; even if many of them are weary and bitter as they see what is happening to their herd. This is how it is for us, Franciscan monks. And this is why we stay here.
