Third Sunday of Lent

Historical Events

The past year has been a year of commemorations. The most important commemoration was the centenary of the Easter rising. Some significant events were entirely overlooked. This event was the inauguration of a century of remarkable evangelisation by Irish women and men. This was conducted by various religious societies.

The Columbans trace their origins to 1916. There is a curious analogy between the idealism which prompted the Rising and the subsequent war of Independence, which inspired the establishment and development of the new missionary society. Fr John Blowick wrote "I am strongly of the opinion that the Rising of 1916 helped our work indirectly. I know that many of the young people of the country had been aroused into a state of heroism and zeal by the Rising of 1916 and by the manner in which the leaders met their death... accordingly they put our appeal before the young people of the country and it fell on soil that was prepared to receive it."

St Patrick's breastplate is a powerful prayer traditionally attributed to our patron saint, Patrick, is bursting with hope and positivity. Reciting this prayer every morning would surely propel us out of bed, ready to face a new day.

THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: Exodus 17:3-7

The Israelites grumbled against Moses for leading them out of Egypt. They were thirsty, and there was no water in the desert, so Moses struck a rock with his staff, and water flowed out for the people to drink.

Second Reading: St. Paul's Letter to the Romans "The love of God has been poured out into our hearts," and that love is immeasurable; "While we were still sinners Christ died for us."

Gospel: John 4:5-42

Jesus approached a Samaritan woman at Jacob's well and asked her for a drink of water. This surprised the woman for several reasons. In the first place, it was unlikely that a man would ask a woman for anything and even more unbelievable that Jesus, a Jew, would ask something of a Samaritan, a great enemy of the Jewish people. Jesus explained to her that our thirst would return if we drank water from the well; but if we drank the water Jesus offered us, we would never thirst again. After Jesus told her many things about herself, she came to believe that he was the Son of God and called others to him.

Way of The Cross with Trocaire this Lent

3rd Station: Jesus falls for the first time

Scripture: ‘Surely he has borne our infirmities and carried our diseases.’ (Isaiah 53:4)

Reflection: Jesus falls three times in the Way of the Cross. With each successive fall, he is weaker and struggles more to get back on his feet. People who suffer most from climate change disasters are those who are poor already and have little recourse to defend themselves or to get back on their feet. Often their home is the first to fall. Humble housing can't withstand the powerful winds and waters.

4th Station: Jesus meets his mother

Scripture: ‘A sword will pierce your own soul too.’ (Luke 2:35)

Reflection: What utter pain Mary must have felt for her son. She had no recourse to soothe, heal and save her child. Mothers around the world grieve in helplessness as they see their children suffer and die. Over 3 million children die every year from malnourishment, while others die due to sudden disasters, to long and perilous journeys, and disease.

5th Station: Simon helps carry his cross

Scripture: ‘As they went out, they came upon a man from Cyrene named Simon; they compelled this man to carry his cross.’ (Matthew 27:32)

Reflection: Simon had come into the city on the day of Jesus' death. He found himself in the crowds along Jesus' pathway to Golgotha, and was picked out by the soldiers to carry Jesus' cross. Who carries the cross in times of climate crisis? The poor are always the first responders in times of disaster. While help from wealthy countries can take days and weeks, it is immediate neighbours who rush in to save, shelter and support as much as possible.

Henry Ford, the Cork Connection

Muskerry Local History Society are organising a lecture on 'Henry Ford, the Cork Connection'. The lecturer, Denis McSweeney, will talk about the origins of the Ford family in Cork, the foundation of the Ford vehicle manufacturing company by Henry Ford to become one of the largest Corporations in the United States and the establishment of the Ford factory on the Marina in Cork which set Ireland on the road to industrialisation in 1917. Henry Ford's subsequent history will be outlined and the history of the changing fortunes of the Marina factory and its eventual closure. Denis, a native of Gurranabraher, joined Ford Cork in 1971 and worked his way to becoming Ford Marketing Director in Cork. This very interesting lecture will be held to commemorate the founding of the Ford factory in Cork, one hundred years ago, in 1917. The lecture will be held at 8.00 pm on Monday, 20 March in Ballincollig Rugby Club.



The Daffodil Day concept originated in Canada six decades ago. The Canadian Cancer Society began using the daffodil in the 1950s. Representing the first flower of spring, it has proven an iconic symbol of hope and cancer research & awareness since, and has become the logo of cancer societies around the world.

Daffodil Day in Ireland The Irish Cancer Society was founded by Professor Austin Darragh, officially coming into existence in 1963. Professor Darragh was inspired to start the society after being shocked by a statistic that 100 people in Ireland died each year from curable skin cancer, simply because they did not have the knowledge or information available to know when to seek treatment. Today, the Irish Cancer Society aims to provide the public with information about cancer, provide services and support for patients and advocate for improvements in cancer care and treatment. The first Irish Daffodil Day was organized by Professor Darragh and Society CEO Tom Hudson in 1988. The day quickly became an annual March tradition. In 2001, the daffodil was adapted as our main logo. Today, Daffodil Day encompasses a host of different events, including nationwide coffee mornings, community events and of course the traditional volunteers on streets providing the public with the yellow flowers. The day helps raise millions of euro to support for the Society's free, nationwide services for those with, and affected by, cancer in Ireland.

Why Support Daffodil Day? We need your support this Daffodil Day more than ever. We are currently facing a health crisis; there is a cancer epidemic in Ireland. This year, 40,000 people will be diagnosed with cancer. That's 150 cases per day. That's a frightening statistic-every day 150 people will be told they have cancer. Too many people are suffering from this devastating disease. That's why we are determined now more than ever to eliminate cancer once and for all. We want to beat cancer through more research, through educating the public on ways to prevent cancer and by helping people who have cancer get the best treatment and care.

This Daffodil Day March 24th let's show cancer that we are coming to get it.
