The church has different colour's for different seasons- they are Green, Purple, Red and White.

The church will wear Rose (or pink) this Sunday. It is the fourth Sunday in Lent which is known as Laetare Sunday. The word 'Laetare' appears in the first prayer of the Mass and means to rejoice.

'REJOICE, O JERUSALEM: and come together all you who love her :

rejoice with joy, you that have been in sorrow :

That you may exult and be filled with consolation.

This day is considered a day of Relaxation from the normal practices of Lent. It is now exactly 21 days to Easter.

This was a day in the past- when servants were released from service for one day to visit their Mother! As they left the church they would pick flowers on their way home to give to their Mother -Hence the origin of Mothering Sunday or Mothers Day. We wish God's Blessing on all our Mothers this Sunday. If your Mother is American (Mothers Day in the USA takes place on May 14), or French (Mothers Day take place on the last Sunday in May in France) or Spanish (Mothers Day takes place on December 8) you can celebrate twice!!!

THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: 1 Samuel 16:1, 6-7, 10-13

The Lord sent Samuel to Bethlehem to the house of Jesse, where Samuel was to anoint the new king of Israel. After Jesse presented each of his sons, the Lord instructed Samuel to anoint the youngest, David.

Second Reading: Ephesians 5:8-14

Live as children of light in goodness, justice, and truth. "Awake, O sleeper, and arise from the dead, and Christ will give you light."

Gospel: John 9:1-41

Using saliva and earth, Jesus made a paste to heal the blind man. The healing became a true conversion for the man, but created some problems for Jesus with the Jewish leaders. Because this healing took place on the Sabbath, the Pharisees accused Jesus of breaking Jewish law. The Pharisees tried to get confirmation of this action from the blind man's parents and from the blind man himself. In the end, the authorities were unable to charge Jesus with any wrongdoing and had to recognise that Jesus was gaining many disciples.

Way of The Cross with Trocaire this Lent

6th Station: Veronica wipes the face of Jesus

Scripture: ‘Many women were also there, looking on from a distance; they had followed Jesus from Galilee and had provided for him.’ (Matthew 27:55)

Reflection: Veronica’s compassion for Jesus overcame any fear that she might have had in stepping out from the anonymity of the crowds to wipe Jesus’ face in front of the soldiers. She didn’t count the possible cost, but stepped forward and responded in love. Lebanon has taken in 1.4 million refugees. What compassion and generosity!

7th Station: Jesus falls for the second time

Scripture: ‘But he was wounded for our transgressions, crushed for our iniquities.’ (Isaiah 53:5)

Reflection: A second fall and Jesus’ struggle to rise up again is that much harder. Climate disasters not only destroy homes, but also sources of livelihood. Fisher folk lose their boats; farmers lose their crops, small enterprises are washed away. How to rise up again? In Honduras, extreme weather and the rising sea leaves are devastating coastal communities. The floods come quickly and cause devastation of homes and land. Salt is left on the land so crops can not be grown for families to eat.

8th Station: Jesus meets the women of Jerusalem

Scripture: ‘But Jesus turned to them and said: Daughters of Jerusalem, do not weep for me; weep rather for yourselves and for your children.’ (Luke 23:28)

Reflection: There is mutual empathy in this encounter between the women of Jerusalem and Jesus. There is shared pain. Women and children are disproportionately affected by climate change. While women themselves suffer, they share the pain of their children’s suffering as well. It is future generations who will bear the brunt of climate change, especially those from the most vulnerable countries such as Honduras and Ethiopia.

History of Mother's Day in Ireland

The history of celebrating Mothering Sunday or Mothers Day in Ireland can be traced to the medieval practice where children from poor families were sent to work as domestic servants and apprentices to work with the rich. Once in the year in the middle of the Lent these children were given a day off to visit their 'Mother Church' and worship Virgin Mary. After visiting the Mother Church or Cathedral of their home town these children visited their mothers and presented them with flowers they picked along the way. Girls bake special Mothering Cake on the day. Pattern of living changed after the Industrial Revolution and Mothering Sunday celebration almost lapsed. The custom was revived after World War II. Americans too helped to bring back the charm of the festival in European countries as their tradition and way of celebrating Mothers Day spread far and wide.
