The Pharisee and the Tax Collector

Today's second reading is one of the better-known passages of the New Testament. "The time has come for me to be gone. I have fought the good fight to the end. I have run the race to the finish. I have kept the faith". May we be worthy to have these words engraved on our tombstone?

We can be reluctant to let others see us as we see ourselves. Occasionally we may meet somebody with whom we can be open, and know we will be accepted. With whom have you that kind of relationship? What is it like to have that freedom? Likewise, with God when we come to pray pretending to be better than we are we are hiding from God. What difference does it make when I pray to God acknowledging my faults and failings? Have we found that in prayer when I am humble, God lifts me up?

The parable today is cautionary about judging others negatively. Perhaps God who looks into the heart sees another picture.

During the month of November, we are reminded and encouraged to pray for our dead. From the earliest time, the church has honoured with respect the memory of the dead. When we pray for our dead we thank the Lord for the promise of ressurrection and renew our hope of eternal life.

THE SUNDAY READINGS

First Reading: Sirach 35:12-14, 16-19 God does not listen only to the powerful. If someone prays humbly and sincerely, God listens, and God acts.

Second Reading: 2 Timothy 4:6-8, 16-18 Paul says he has kept the faith and God stood by him. The conclusion to his life will be a crown of glory in heaven. That same promise is ours.

Gospel: Luke 18:9-14

From time to time our children live in a "me first world," but Jesus wasn't too impressed with the self-centeredness of the Pharisee in today's Gospel. The Pharisee was quite certain that he was a good and righteous man—better than most. For sure, he was better than the tax collector. But as Jesus often did in his teachings, he turned society's ideas upside down. It was really the humble tax collector recognizing his own sinfulness that Jesus said would be exalted.

Life After Death

November is a month in which the Church reminds the Faithful of our dead. It calls on the praying Church on earth to offer prayer and sacrifice for those who have gone before us in the sign of Faith. There is a danger today that people can believe that our departed relatives may not need our prayers, but this danger must be avoided. Death, for many, is a fearful event because it precedes the judgement. Jesus spoke very clearly and consistently about a final judgement.

The judgement spoken of by Jesus is not to be understood as a once -and-for-all event in the future. God's judgement is already at work in the present, calling us to live lives in harmony with our nature as children of god.

If we see God's judgement as acting also in the present, death will lose its fearful significance. St. John does not use the term 'hell' but speaks of punishment in terms of darkness and exclusion from God. St. Paul does not use any fiery images but speaks of eternal destruction and banishment from the face of God. Hell is the final loss of God's life and friendship. But already in life we can exclude ourselves from friendship from God. In life, however, there is hope of change. We can once again respond to God's love.

Jesus tells us that Heaven is the reward of the virtuous. It is the complete fulfilment; it is what we were created for. Judgement, Hell and Heaven are not events that occur after death; they already begin here when we answer yes or no to God's invitation to love Him
